The term pessimism derives from the Latin word *pessimus*, meaning 'the worst'. It was first used by Jesuit critics of Voltaire's 1759 novel *Candide, ou l'Optimisme*. Voltaire was satirizing the philosophy of Leibniz who maintained that this was the 'best (optimum) of all possible worlds'. In their attacks on Voltaire, the Jesuits of the *Revue de Trévoux* accused him of pessimisme. 2a1cba9ae3

Darren Glass Darren Glass (born 14 May 1981) is a former Australian rules footballer who played as a full-back for the West Coast Eagles in the Australian Football League (AFL). He was later recruited by West Coast with the 11th pick in the 1999 National Draft, making his debut for the club the following season.
