

Rheumatoid Factor 10 Meaning

There are several types of arthritis. The most common forms are osteoarthritis (most commonly seen in weight-bearing joints) and rheumatoid arthritis. Osteoarthritis usually occurs as a person ages and often affects the hips, knees, shoulders, and fingers. Rheumatoid arthritis is an autoimmune disorder that often affects the hands and feet. Other types of arthritis include gout, lupus, spondyloarthritis, and septic arthritis. These are inflammatory based types of rheumatic disease.

Synovitis The joint usually swells due to synovial fluid collection. This membrane lines joints that possess cavities, known as synovial joints. is more commonly found in rheumatoid arthritis than in other forms of arthritis, and can thus serve as a distinguishing factor, although it is also present Synovitis is the medical term for inflammation of the synovial membrane. The condition is usually painful, particularly when the joint is moved

Palindromic rheumatism Proposed classification. Rheumatoid factor may be present especially in the group that is likely to develop rheumatoid arthritis. are otherwise unremarkable

== Types == The cause of rheumatoid arthritis is believed to involve a combination of genetic and environmental factors. The underlying mechanism involves the body's immune system attacking the joints. This results in inflammation and thickening of the joint capsule. It also affects the underlying bone and cartilage. The diagnosis is based on a person's signs and symptoms. X-rays and laboratory testing may support a diagnosis or exclude other diseases with similar symptoms. Other diseases that may present similarly include systemic lupus erythematosus, psoriatic arthritis, and fibromyalgia. Early treatment for arthritis commonly includes resting the affected joint and conservative measures such as heating or icing. Weight loss and exercise may also be useful to reduce the force across a weight-bearing joint. Medication intervention for...

Rheumatoid arthritis patients often Arthritis is a general medical term used to describe a disorder in which the smooth cartilagenous layer that lines a joint is lost, resulting in bone grinding on bone during joint movement. arthritis include: rheumatoid factor, antinuclear factor (ANF), extractable nuclear antigen, and specific antibodies. Other symptoms may include redness, warmth, swelling, and decreased range of motion of the affected joints. In certain types of arthritis, other organs, such as the skin, are also affected

The term "Rheumatic Diseases" is used in MeSH to refer to connective tissue disorders. The branch of medicine devoted to the diagnosis and therapy of rheumatism is called rheumatology. Many rheumatic disorders of chronic, intermittent pain (including joint pain, neck pain or back pain) have historically been caused by infectious diseases. Their etiology was unknown until the 20th century and not treatable. Postinfectious arthritis, also known as reactive arthritis, and rheumatic fever are other examples. In the United States, major rheumatic disorders are divided into 10 major categories based on the nomenclature and classification... Synovitis may occur in association with arthritis as well as lupus, gout, and other conditions. Synovitis is more commonly found in rheumatoid arthritis than in other forms of arthritis, and can thus serve as a distinguishing factor, although it is also present in many joints affected with osteoarthritis. In rheumatoid arthritis, the fibroblast-like synoviocytes, highly specialized mesenchymal cells found in the synovial membrane, play an active and prominent role in the synovitis. Long term occurrence of synovitis can result in degeneration of the joint.

The underlying mechanism involves Rheumatoid arthritis (RA) is a long-term autoimmune disorder that primarily affects joints. Often, symptoms come on gradually over weeks to months. This may result in a low red blood cell count, inflammation around the lungs, fever, low energy and inflammation around the heart. Most commonly, the wrist and hands are involved, with the same joints typically involved on

Rheumatism There is a close overlap between the term soft tissue disorder and rheumatism. Rheumatism does not designate any specific disorder, but covers at least 200 different conditions, including arthritis and "non-articular rheumatism", also known as "regional pain syndrome" or "soft tissue rheumatism". Sometimes the term "soft tissue rheumatic disorders" is used to describe these conditions. Rheumatoid factor may be present, especially in the group that is likely to develop rheumatoid arthritis. JIA is an autoimmune, noninfective, inflammatory joint disease, the cause of which remains poorly understood. It is characterised by chronic joint inflammation. JIA is a subset of childhood arthritis, but unlike other, more transient forms of childhood arthritis, JIA is a lifelong condition with relapse of disease after treatment discontinuation being common. JIA has clinical and pathologic correlates to adult inflammatory and auto-immune arthritis, with the diseases believed to exist on a continuum from childhood to adulthood. There are six biologically and clinically distinct forms of JIA: oligoarticular JIA, rheumatoid factor negative polyarticular JIA, rheumatoid factor positive polyarticular JIA, enthesitis-related arthritis, psoriatic JIA and systemic JIA.
