However, the phrase is more generally and commonly used by Muslims, Arab Christians, and Arabic speakers of other religions to refer to events that one hopes will happen in the future, having the same meaning as the English word "hopefully". 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languages, the expression was borrowed as *oxalá* or *ojalá*, and it is used in a similar way. Although the Arabic phrase directly translates to "God willing", its meaning depends on the context. When used sincerely or in formal settings, it expresses the speaker's hope for a specific outcome; however, in everyday speech, it is frequently used to suggest uncertainty... In the scriptures of the Abrahamic religions, God is described as being a personal creator, speaking in the first person and showing emotion such as anger and pride, and sometimes appearing in anthropomorphic shape. In the Pentateuch, for example, God talks with and instructs his prophets and is conceived as possessing volition, emotions (such as anger, grief and happiness), intention, and other attributes characteristic of a human person. Personal relationships with God may be described in the same ways as human relationships, such as a Father, as in Christianity, or a

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Friend as in Sufism. The

the Kaaba before Islam, is often
mentioned in these claims. The

in 1901 with the archaeologist

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Hubal originated from the Levant or Mesopotamia. Names of God In the passage, YHWH, the personal name of God, is revealed directly to Moses. The English word god (and its equivalent in other languages) is used by multiple religions as a noun to refer to different deities, or specifically to the Supreme Being, as denoted in English by the capitalized and uncapitalized terms God and god. The personal or proper name for God in many of these languages may either be distinguished from such attributes, or homonymic. For example, in Judaism the tetragrammaton is
