After tobacco, alcohol is the second leading preventable cause of death and hospitalisation in Australia. The consumption of alcohol increased from the mid-1960s to the early 1980s Alcohol is commonly consumed and available at pubs and liquor stores in Australia – all of which are private enterprises. Spirits can be purchased at liquor stores and pubs, whereas most grocery stores do not sell them, although they may have separate liquor stores on their premises f2155d4868

The country is second in wine exports and ninth in worldwide consumption, with Spaniards drinking, on average, 21. 6 litres (5. 0 million acres) planted in wine grapes, making it the most widely planted wine-producing nation, but the third largest producer of wine in the world, behind Italy and France and ahead of the United States; this is due, in part, to the very low yields and wide spacing of the old vines planted on the dry soils found in some of the Spanish wine regions. Hundreds of millions of bottles of wine had been turned into industrial alcohol every year, a practice that had sometimes been described as "emergency distillation" at a cost to taxpayers of €500 million per year. In August 2023, France and the European Union set aside €200 million to turn surplus wine into industrial alcohol, together with a further €57 million to pull up around 9,500 hectares of vines in the Bordeaux region, after falling demand left producers with unsellable stock.
