Consumer behaviour Consumer behaviour emerged in the 1940–1950s as a distinct sub-discipline of marketing, but has become an interdisciplinary social science that blends elements from psychology, sociology, social anthropology, anthropology, ethnography, ethnology, marketing, and economics (especially behavioural economics). Authentic leadership identification, empowerment, job satisfaction, organisational commitment, organisational identification, organisational justice, psychological capital, well-being Authentic leadership is most recently defined as "concordant, values-based leader signalling of self-awareness, internalised moral perspective, balanced processing, and relational transparency". Meta-analytic reviews link authentic leadership ratings with follower trust, work engagement, citizenship behaviour, and performance indicators across cultures and settings. The literature broadly organises the construct around the same four dimensions established in earlier models. In this formulation, authentic leadership is a subtype of leadership expressed through signals that followers can observe and interpret in interaction. This framing connects leader conduct with follower perceptions and workplace outcomes

The expression subjective character of experience was introduced by philosopher Thomas Nagel in his influential 1974 essay "What Is It Like to Be a Bat?", in which he argued that every conscious organism has its own unique point of view. Nagel maintained that although objective scientific investigation can describe the physical and functional characteristics of an organism, it cannot fully capture what it is like for that organism to have its own experiences. His argument became a landmark in discussions concerning consciousness, reductionism, and the explanatory limits of physical... As a term, swarming is applied particularly to insects, but can also be applied to any other entity or animal that exhibits swarm behaviour. The term flocking or murmuration can refer specifically to swarm behaviour in birds, herding to refer to swarm behaviour in tetrapods, and shoaling or schooling to refer to swarm behaviour in fish. Phytoplankton also gather in huge swarms called blooms, although these organisms are algae and are not self-propelled the way most animals are. By extension, the term "swarm" is applied also to inanimate entities which exhibit parallel behaviours, as in a robot swarm, an earthquake swarm or a star swarm. A good safety culture can be promoted by senior management commitment to safety, realistic practices for handling hazards, continuous organisational learning, and care and concern for hazards shared across the workforce. Beyond organisational learning, individual training forms the foundation from which to build a systemic safety culture. == Centralised versus decentralised systems == Design for behaviour change developed from work on design psychology (also: behavioural design) conducted by Don Norman in the 1980s. Norman's 'psychology of everyday things' introduced concepts from ecological psychology and human factors research to designers, such as affordances, constraint feedback and mapping. They have provided guiding principles with regard to user experience and the intuitive use of artefacts, although this work did not yet focus specifically on influencing behavioural change. == History == A decentralised system, on the other hand, is one in which complex behaviour emerges through the work of lower level components operating on local information, not the instructions of any commanding

influence. This form of control is known as distributed control, or control in which each component of the system is equally... Gestalt psychology is often associated with the idea that the whole is different from the sum of its parts. In Gestalt theory, information is perceived as wholes rather than disparate parts which are then processed summatively. As used in Gestalt psychology, the German word Gestalt (gə-SHTA(H)LT; German: [gə'ʃtalt] ; meaning "form") is interpreted as "pattern" or "configuration".

History A centralised system is one in which a central controller exercises control over the lower-level components of the system directly or through the use of a power hierarchy (such as instructing a middle level component to instruct a lower level component). The complex behaviour exhibited by this system is thus the result of the central controller's "control" over lower level components in the system, including the active supervision of the lower-level components. Developed during the 1970s, mental management theory has expanded on several previous academic dialogues. Having first emerged for educational purposes, the mental management approach has been developed on the research of French educator and philosopher Antoine de La Garanderie who identified distinct mental processes that support learning. His research builds on several previous theories, including the works on introspection by Jean Martin Charcot, Alfred Binet, Maine de Biran and Albert Burloud, who was La Garanderie's professor. Today, its studies are used in four domains systematically; individual functioning; education; therapy; and business. From a more abstract point of view, swarm behaviour is the collective motion of a large number of self-propelled entities. From the perspective of the mathematical modeller, it is an emergent behaviour arising from simple rules that are followed by individuals and does not involve any central... Scholars debate definition, measurement, and inference in authentic leadership research. Behavioural design Areas in which design for behaviour change has been most commonly applied include health and wellbeing, sustainability, safety and social context, as well as crime prevention. The toolkit has also been incorporated Behavioural design is a sub-category of design, which is concerned with how design can shape, or be used to influence human behaviour. contexts such as digital product design, service development, organisational change and behavioural communication campaigns. All approaches of design for behaviour change acknowledge that artifacts have an important influence on human behaviour and/or behavioural decisions. They strongly draw on theories of behavioural change, including the division into personal, behavioural, and environmental characteristics as drivers for behaviour change

Subjective character of experience While advances in neuroscience have identified neural correlates associated with perception, attention, emotion The subjective character of experience, also referred to as subjective experience, is the first-person aspect of conscious experience. phenomena, including behaviour and brain activity. Subjective experience is commonly described as encompassing sensory experiences and mental events, including perceptions, emotions, thoughts, memories, intentions, and related conscious phenomena that arise from the unique perspective of an individual. The concept is central to philosophy of mind, psychology, phenomenology, and consciousness studies, where it is used to describe the fact that conscious experiences are directly accessible only to the subject undergoing them

The study of consumer behaviour formally investigates individual qualities such as demographics, personality lifestyles, and behavioural variables (like usage rates, usage occasion, loyalty, brand advocacy, and willingness to provide referrals), in an attempt to understand people's wants and consumption patterns. Consumer behaviour also investigates on the influences on the consumer, from social groups such as family, friends, sports, and reference groups, to society in general (brand-influencers, opinion leaders... It differs from Gestalt therapy, which is only peripherally linked to Gestalt psychology.

Safety culture It is informed by the organization's leadership and the beliefs, perceptions and values that employees share in relation to risks within the organization, workplace or community. hazards, continuous organisational learning, and care and concern for hazards shared across the workforce. Beyond organisational learning, individual Safety culture is the element of organizational culture which is concerned with the maintenance of safety and compliance with safety standards. Safety culture has been described in a variety of ways: notably, the National Academies of Science and the Association of Land Grant and Public Universities have published summaries on this topic in 2014 and 2016

Perceptual control theory Biological homeostasis and reflexes are simple, low-level examples. PCT research is published in experimental psychology, neuroscience, ethology, anthropology, linguistics, sociology, robotics, developmental psychology, organizational psychology and management, and a number of other fields. An example is a thermostat. In a living organism, reference values for controlled perceptual variables are endogenously maintained. PCT has been applied to design and administration of. In PCT it is the internal representation of the state of some variable in the environment—a “perception” in Perceptual control theory (PCT) is a model of behavior based on the properties of negative feedback control loops. It differs fundamentally from some models in behavioral and cognitive psychology that model stimuli as causes of behavior (linear causation). The discovery of mathematical principles of control introduced a way to model a negative feedback loop closed through the environment (circular causation), which spawned perceptual control theory. In engineering control theory, reference values are set by a user outside the system. A control loop maintains a sensed variable at or near a reference value by means of the effects of its outputs upon that variable, as mediated by physical properties of the environment. it is the system's output that is controlled

Mental management Treatment Mental management is a concept in the field of cognitive psychology that explores the cognitive, cerebral or thought-based processes in their different forms.
