Gottlob Frege and Bertrand Russell were pivotal figures in analytic philosophy's "linguistic turn". These writers were followed by Ludwig Wittgenstein (*Tractatus Logico-Philosophicus*), the Vienna Circle, logical positivists, and Willard Van Orman Quine. Throughout the book Tolstoy demonstrates an "unremitting moralism", evaluating artworks in light of his radical Christian ethics, and displaying a willingness to dismiss accepted masters, including Beethoven, Wagner, Shakespeare, and Dante, as well as the bulk of his own writings. In addition to the 88 "official" temples of the pilgrimage, there are 20 bekkaku (空白) temples, which are officially associated with the Shikoku Pilgrimage (and hundreds more bangai (空白) temples, simply meaning "outside the numbers", which are not considered part of the official 88). Wittgenstein's biographer Ray Monk writes, "This is partly because of the great differences between his early and late work, but also because of the equally important continuities between the two". The early work in which Wittgenstein expressed his "older way of thinking" is the only book Wittgenstein published in his lifetime, the *Tractatus Logico-Philosophicus*.

Thiele, using the pseudonym George Douglas, co-wrote the song with George Weiss. Thiele's real name has been used for the composer credits from 1988 onward. Thiele said the following regarding his inspiration for the song: "[I]n the mid-1960s during the deepening national traumas of the Kennedy assassination, Vietnam, racial strife, and turmoil everywhere, my co-writer George David Weiss and I had an idea to write a 'different' song specifically for Louis Armstrong that would be called 'What a Wonderful World.'"
