In the early 1960s, approximately 9 to 12 percent of blacks were considered middle class, whereas over half of the black population was categorized as poor. S. There has been significant global middle-class growth over time. In February 2009, The Economist asserted that over half of the world's population belonged to the middle class, as a result of rapid growth in emerging countries. It characterized the middle class as having a substantial amount of discretionary income and defined it as beginning at the point where people have roughly a third of their income left for discretionary spending after paying for basic food and shelter. 3a30708bb1

Social class in the United Kingdom Since the advent of industrialisation, this system has been in a constant state of revision, and new factors other than birth (for example, education) are now a

greater part of creating identity in Britain. British society, like its European neighbours and most societies in world history, was traditionally (before the Industrial Revolution) divided hierarchically within a system that involved the hereditary transmission of occupation, social status and political influence. United Kingdom was organised on a class basis, with the House of Lords representing the hereditary upper class and the House of Commons representing everybody. The social structure of the United Kingdom has historically been highly influenced by the concept of social class, which continues to affect British society today.

American middle class Depending on the class model used, the middle class constitutes anywhere from 25% to 75% of households. or upper middle class (~15-20% of all households) consisting of highly educated, salaried professionals and managers, and the lower middle class (~33%). Though the American middle class does not have a definitive definition, contemporary social scientists have put forward several ostensibly congruent theories on it.

Social class Membership of a social class is commonly considered dependent on education, wealth, occupation, income, and belonging to a particular subculture or social network. In the United States, the upper middle class is defined as consisting of white-collar professionals who have above-average personal incomes, advanced educational degrees and a high degree of autonomy in their work, leading to higher job satisfaction. Middle class Theories such as "Paradox of Interest" use decile groups and wealth distribution data to determine the size and wealth share of the middle class. Common definitions for the middle class range from the middle fifth of individuals on a nation's income ladder, to everyone but the poorest and wealthiest 20%. Usually, these are the wealthiest members of class society, and wield the greatest political power. The term has a wide range of sometimes conflicting meanings, and there is no broad consensus on a definition of class. Some people argue that due to social mobility, class boundaries do not exist. In common parlance, the term social class is usually synonymous with socioeconomic class, defined as "people having the same social, economic, cultural, political or educational status", such as the working class, or "an emerging professional class".
