They include hormonal and non-hormonal intrauterine devices (IUDs) and subdermal hormonal contraceptive implants. They are the most effective reversible methods of contraception because their efficacy is not reliant on patient compliance. Contraceptive implant As with other contraceptives, a contraceptive implant is designed to prevent pregnancy, but it does not protect against sexually transmitted infections. Potential adverse effects of copper IUDs include heavier menses and increased menstrual cramping. The implant may depend on the timed release of hormones to hinder ovulation or sperm development, the ability of copper to act as a natural spermicide within the uterus, or it may work using a non-hormonal, physical blocking mechanism. Levonorgestrel It decreases the chances of pregnancy by 57–93%. It is combined with an estrogen to make combination birth control pills. Levonorgestrel works by preventing or delaying ovulation so an egg cannot be released. The dosage used for emergency contraception is ineffective when ovulation has already occurred, and has been found to have no effect on implantation. A levonorgestrel-releasing implant is also available in some countries. In an intrauterine device (IUD), such as Mirena among others, it is effective for the long-term prevention of pregnancy. LARCs are often recommended to people seeking convenient and cost effective contraception. In one study, LARC users saved thousands of dollars over a five-year period compared to those who buy condoms and birth control pills. LARCs can generally be safely and effectively used by people of any body

weight, adolescents, and people who have not yet had children. Common side effects include heavy menstrual periods and increased menstrual cramps (dysmenorrhea). Rarely, the device may come out or perforate the uterine wall. Side effects include irregular periods, benign ovarian cysts, pelvic pain, and depression. Rarely uterine perforation may occur. Use is not recommended during pregnancy but is safe with breastfeeding. The IUD with progestogen is a type of long-acting reversible birth control. It works by thickening the mucus at the opening of the cervix, stopping the buildup of the lining of the uterus, and occasionally preventing ovulation. Emergency contraception is a birth control measure taken to reduce the risk of pregnancy following unprotected sexual intercourse or when other regular contraceptive measures have not worked properly or have not been used correctly. It is intended to be used occasionally and is not the same as medical abortion. Emergency contraception is offered to women who do not wish to conceive but have had unprotected sex on any day of the menstrual cycle, from day 21 after giving birth, or from day five after abortion or miscarriage. Emergency contraception measures include tablets taken... == Early life and education == While many methods may prevent conception, only male and female condoms are effective in preventing sexually transmitted infections. Common side effects include nausea, breast tenderness, headaches, and increased, decreased, or irregular menstrual bleeding. When used as an emergency contraceptive, if pregnancy occurs, there is no evidence that its use harms the fetus. It is safe to use during breastfeeding. Birth control that contains levonorgestrel will not change... In 2008, the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists (ACOG) launched The Long-Acting Reversible Contraception Program with the intention to reduce rates of unintended pregnancy by promoting LARCs, often referred to as a "LARC-first" model. Rates of LARC use in the United States rose steadily in that time frame, from 3.7% in 2007 to 10% in 2019. LARC methods...

Hormonal contraception is highly effective: when taken on the prescribed schedule, users of steroid hormone methods experience pregnancy rates of less than 1% per year. An IUS/IUD must be inserted by a health professional. In the ensuing decades, many other delivery methods have been developed. Almost all methods are composed of steroid hormones, although in India one selective estrogen receptor modulator is marketed as a contraceptive

== Medical uses == IUDs are a safe and effective birth control method that can be divided into two major categories based on the mechanism the device uses to prevent pregnancy: hormonal (levonorgestrel) IUDs and copper IUDs. Both types of IUDs can be used in most women, including adolescents, those who have never been pregnant, and those who have previously had children. They do not affect breastfeeding and can be inserted immediately after delivery. They may also be used immediately after an abortion. Globally, 19.4% of women of reproductive age use intrauterine contraception according to 2019 data. The IUD has a more invasive insertion procedure than other birth control methods. However, among birth control methods, IUDs, along with other contraceptive implants, result in the greatest satisfaction among users.

Copper IUD Following its removal, fertility quickly returns. It may be used for contraception regardless of age or previous pregnancy, and may be placed immediately after a vaginal delivery, cesarean delivery, or surgical abortion. The device is placed in the uterus and lasts up to twelve years, depending on the amount of copper present in the device.
