Hallucinatory palinopsia, usually due to seizures or posterior cortical lesions, describes afterimages that are formed, long-lasting, and high resolution. Illusory palinopsia, usually due to migraines, head trauma, prescription drugs, visual snow syndrome or hallucinogen persisting perception disorder (HPPD), describes afterimages that are affected by ambient light and motion and are unformed, indistinct, or low resolution.

For the diagnosis, other psychological, psychiatric, and neurological conditions must be ruled out, and they must cause distress in everyday life. In the DSM-5 it is diagnostic code 292.89 (F16.983). In the ICD-10, the diagnosis code F16.7 corresponds most closely. It is rarely recognized by hallucinogen users and psychiatrists, and is differentiated from hallucinogen-induced psychotic disorder in that it does not involve paranoia, insomnia, changes in thinking, or delusions, and relates to lasting visual changes only. Illusory palinopsia Illusory palinopsia is likely due to sustained awareness of a stimulus and is similar to a visual illusion: the distorted perception of a real external stimulus. Palinopsia is a broad term describing a heterogeneous group of symptoms, which is divided into hallucinatory palinopsia and illusory palinopsia. Illusory palinopsia is caused by migraines, hallucinogen persisting perception disorder (HPPD), prescription Illusory palinopsia is a subtype of palinopsia, a visual disturbance defined as the persistence or recurrence of a visual image after the stimulus has been removed. distorted perception of a real external stimulus

Illusory palinopsia is caused by migraines, hallucinogen persisting perception disorder (HPPD), prescription drugs, and head trauma, but is also sometimes idiopathic. Illusory palinopsia consists of afterimages that are short-lived or unformed, occur at the same location in the visual field as the original stimulus, and are often exposed or exacerbated based on environmental parameters such as stimulus intensity, background contrast, fixation, and movement. Illusory palinopsia symptoms occur continuously or predictably, based on environmental conditions. The term is from Greek: palin for "again" and opsia for "seeing". == Disorders usually first diagnosed in infancy, childhood, or adolescence == The incidence rate of HIPD with psychedelics is 0.002% to 0.6% in different types of studies and is considered to be low and rare. HIPD with psychedelics is more likely to occur in individuals with a personal or family history of mental illness and is far more likely to occur in people with schizophrenia. Symptoms may include visual snow, trails and after images (palinopsia), light fractals on flat surfaces, intensified colors, altered motion perception,

pareidolia, micropsia, and macropsia. The DSM-IV-TR contains expanded descriptions of disorders. Wordings were clarified and errors were corrected. The categorizations and the diagnostic criteria were largely unchanged. No new disorders or conditions were introduced, although a small number of subtypes were added and removed. ICD-9-CM codes that were changed since the release of IV were updated. Depersonalization is a feeling of being disconnected or detached from oneself. derealization, precipitating a form of the disorder called hallucinogen persisting perception disorder. Derealization is described as detachment from one's surroundings.
