This publishing entity was a front created specifically in order to provide a publishing company willing and able to publish and distribute the Protocols. It remains widely available in numerous languages, in print and on the Internet, and continues to be presented by some antisemitic groups as a genuine document. A Protocol of 1919 was first published in the Estonian newspaper Postimees (morning edition) on 31 December 1919. Postimees detailed how the originally Hebrew text was found from the pocket of Shunderev, a Jewish Bolshevik battalion commander in the 11th Rifle Regiment who had been killed in action on the night before 9 December. His first idea was a satirical film, but when he found that two serious dramatizations had already been produced, he instead made a documentary.
