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The two main types of human skin are: glabrous skin, the hairless skin on the palms and soles (also referred to as the "palmoplantar" surfaces), and hair-bearing skin. Within the latter type, the hairs occur in structures called pilosebaceous units, each with hair follicle, sebaceous gland, and associated arrector pili muscle. Pigmented birthmarks caused by excess skin pigment cells include: moles, café au lait spots, and Mongolian spots. Vascular birthmarks, also called red birthmarks, are caused by increased blood vessels and include macular stains (salmon patches), hemangiomas, and port-wine stains. A little over 1 in 10 babies have a vascular birthmark present by age 1. Phakomatosis Café au lait spots are one of the most characteristic features of neurofibromatosis type Phakomatoses (sing. phakomatosis), also known as neurocutaneous syndromes, are a group of multisystemic diseases that most prominently affect structures primarily derived from the ectoderm such as the central nervous system, skin and eyes. Presentations may vary dramatically between patients

with the same particular syndrome due to mosaicism, variable expressivity, and penetrance. The majority of phakomatoses are single-gene disorders that may be inherited in an autosomal dominant, autosomal recessive or X-linked pattern. used in atypical presentations or for family planning decisions

15 β -Hydroxycyproterone acetate Many phakomatoses are caused by mutations which alter functioning of the RAS-mitogen-activated protein kinase (MAPK) pathway and the PI3K/AKT/mTOR pathway that regulates cellular growth, differentiation, proliferation and death. This results in a tendency for individuals with these mutations to develop various types of benign or malignant tumors depending on the particular mutation.
