

How To Test For Lymphoma

There are several subtypes, the most common of which is follicular lymphoma. Others include cutaneous T-cell lymphoma, marginal zone lymphoma, chronic lymphocytic leukemia, and Waldenström macroglobulinemia.

History

Indolent lymphoma is usually considered incurable without the use of allogeneic stem cell transplantation, unless the disease is localised. However, due to its slow-growing nature and response to treatment, patients often have prolonged survival.

In the US and Europe, this disease is the second most common form of non-Hodgkin's lymphomas, exceeded only by diffuse large B-cell lymphoma. FL accounts for 10-20% of non-Hodgkin's lymphomas, and ~15,000 new cases of follicular lymphoma are diagnosed each year in the US and Europe. Recent studies indicate that FL is similarly prevalent in Japan.

Risk factors for Hodgkin lymphoma include infection with Epstein-Barr virus and a history of the disease in the family. Risk factors for common types of non-Hodgkin lymphomas include autoimmune diseases, HIV/AIDS, infection with human T-lymphotropic virus, immunosuppressant medications, and some pesticides. Eating large amounts of red meat and tobacco smoking may also increase the risk. Diagnosis, if enlarged lymph nodes are present, is usually by lymph node biopsy. Blood, urine, and bone marrow testing may also be useful in the diagnosis.

The causes of diffuse large B-cell lymphoma are not well understood. Usually DLBCL arises from normal B cells, but it can also represent a malignant transformation of other types of lymphoma (particularly marginal zone lymphomas) or, in rare cases termed Richter's transformation, chronic lymphocytic leukemia. The full-length protein ALK was identified in 1997 by two groups. Types of tests

Lymphoma Signs and symptoms may include enlarged lymph nodes, fever, drenching sweats, unintended weight loss, itching, and constantly feeling tired. The enlarged lymph nodes are usually painless. The sweats are most common at night. Follicular lymphoma The cancerous cells in FL typically form follicular or follicle-like structures (see adjacent Figure) in the tissues they invade. This cancer is a form of Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma and it originates from the uncontrolled division of specific types of B-cells (centrocytes and centroblasts). Dimerization of NPM constitutively activates the ALK kinase domain. cecbecc9e2 People with mantle cell lymphoma typically present with symptoms later in life, with a median age of onset between 60 and 70 years of age. In Western countries MCL accounts for around 7% of adult non-Hodgkin's lymphomas, with between 4 and 8 per cases per million diagnosed each year. The incidence of MCL increases with age. Most individuals have no symptoms when they are first diagnosed with CLL. Around five to 10% of patients may experience fever, fatigue, unexplained weight loss, loss of appetite, painless swelling of the lymph nodes, enlargement of the spleen, and/or anemia. These symptoms often worsen over time. Patients with CLL also have an increased risk of developing serious infections. The exact cause of CLL is unknown, but risk factors include a family history of CLL, tobacco use, or environmental exposure to Agent Orange, ionizing radiation and certain insecticides. Diagnosis is typically by testing the blood for high numbers of mature lymphocytes and "smudge cells".

Diagnosis is conducted by confirming the presence of cancer and identifying Reed-Sternberg cells in lymph node biopsies.
