Capital punishment institutions. The sentence ordering that an offender be punished in such a manner is called a death sentence, and the act of carrying out the sentence is an execution. Etymologically, the term capital (lit. 'of the head', derived via the Latin capitalis from caput, "head") refers to execution by beheading, but executions are carried out by many methods. A prisoner who has been sentenced to death and awaits execution is condemned and is commonly referred to as being "on death row". A variety of philosophical theories have been developed to justify punishment. Important views argue that punishment deters wrongdoing, rehabilitates offenders, incapacitates the dangerous, or gives justice to those who deserve it. Moral justifications of punishment are found even in ancient civilisations, with Aristotle writing extensively of the ethical implications of imposing pain onto an individual or group.

Deterrence theory is the scholarship and practice of how threats of using force by one party can convince another party to refrain from initiating some other course of action. Deterrence in an international relations context is the application of deterrence theory to avoid conflict. The central problem of deterrence revolves around how to credibly threaten military action or nuclear punishment on the adversary despite its costs to the deterrer

Crimes that are punishable by death are known as capital crimes, capital offences, or capital felonies, and vary depending on the jurisdiction, but commonly include serious crimes against a person, such as murder, assassination, mass murder, child murder, aggravated rape, terrorism, aircraft hijacking, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and genocide, along with crimes against the state such as attempting to overthrow government, treason, espionage, sedition, and piracy. Also, in some cases, acts of recidivism, aggravated robbery, and kidnapping... Historically, the Catholic Church has supported the death penalty. Figures including Pope Innocent I, Pope Innocent III, Thomas

Aquinas, Francisco de Vitoria, Francisco Suárez, Pope Pius V, Robert Bellarmine, Alphonsus Liguori, Thomas More, John Henry Newman, Pope Pius X, and Pope Pius XII all wrote in support of the practice. Conversely, several theologians and Church Fathers prior to the 5th century including Justin Martyr, Tertullian, Origen, and Cyprian of Carthage have opposed it.

30aa66129e Early Western theories of justice were developed in part by Ancient Greek philosophers such as Plato in his work *The Republic*, and Aristotle, in his *Nicomachean Ethics* and *Politics*. Saint Augustine (354-430) emphasized the importance of justice, expressing the opinion that, without justice, "kingdoms are nothing but gangs of criminals on a large scale".
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Labeling theory The theory was prominent during the 1960s and 1970s, and some modified versions of the theory have developed and are still currently popular. Labeling theory holds that deviance is not inherent in an act, but instead focuses on the tendency of majorities to negatively label minorities or those seen as deviant from standard cultural norms. Labeling theory posits that self-identity and the behavior of individuals may be determined or influenced by the terms used to describe or classify them. The classical Confucian theory of justice developed around the same time, and had little in common with Western theories of justice. Instead, it posited that justice was a personal and public virtue, but did not include freedom or equality, and was not part of the law. Deterrence is unlike compellence, which is the attempt to drive an actor (such as a state) to take an action (i.e. alter the status quo). Both are forms of coercion. Compellence has been characterized as harder to successfully implement than deterrence. Deterrence also tends to be distinguished from defense or the use of full force in wartime. 30aa66129e Two of the most common political and ethical motivations for formal punishment are utilitarianism and retributivism. Both these concepts have been articulated by law-makers and law-enforcers, but may be seen as descriptive rather than explanative. Sociologists note that although attempts of justification are made in terms of these principles, this does not fully explain why violent punitive acts occur. Social acceptance of corporal punishment is high in countries where it remains lawful, particularly among more traditional groups. In many cultures, parents have historically been regarded as having the right, if not the duty, to physically punish misbehaving children in order to teach appropriate behavior or to stop inappropriate behavior immediately or in the short run. Many studies, on the other hand, have found that corporal punishment may have the opposite effect in the long run, increasing the chances of more aggressive behavior in children and less long-term obedience.
