Verbs are conjugated according to definiteness, tense, mood, person and number. Nouns can be declined with 18 case suffixes, most of which correspond to English prepositions.

English words may consist of multiple prefixes: anti-pseudo-classicism (containing both an anti- prefix and a pseudo- prefix).

A pronoun substitutes a noun or a noun phrase, with or without a determiner: it, this.

All neuter words have identical nominative and accusative forms, and all feminine words have identical nominative and accusative plurals.

Hungarian is a highly agglutinative language which uses various affixes, mainly suffixes, to change the meaning of words and their grammatical function. These affixes are mostly attached according to vowel harmony.

The language has a three ejective consonant phonemes and two implosive consonant phonemes, fitting the pattern of the Ethiopian Language Area. It has two tones and five vowels. Duration (or gemination) is distinctive for both consonants and vowels.

Hungarian is a topic-prominent language and so its word order depends on the topic-comment structure of the sentence (that is, what aspect is assumed to be known and what is emphasized).

== Comparison with determiners ==

Neutral Hungarian sentences have a subject-verb-object word order, like English. Hungarian is a null-subject language and so the subject does not have to be explicitly stated. Word order is determined not by syntactic roles but rather by pragmatic factors. Emphasis is placed on the word or phrase immediately before the finite verb.

In English, all prefixes are derivational. This contrasts with English suffixes, which may be either derivational or inflectional.

Japanese grammar Japanese has a complex system of honorifics with verb forms and vocabulary to indicate the relative status of the speaker, the listener, and persons mentioned. Sentence-final particles are used to add emotional or emphatic impact, or make questions. Verbs are conjugated, primarily for tense and voice, but not person. Japanese adjectives are also conjugated. Its phrases are exclusively head-final and compound sentences are exclusively left-branching. Nouns have no grammatical number or gender, and there are no articles. Word order is normally subject-object-verb with particles marking the grammatical function of words, and sentence structure is topic-comment.

Pro-forms are divided into several categories, according to which part of speech they substitute:

Nouns, adjectives and pronouns are declined in four grammatical cases - nominative, accusative, genitive and dative, in singular and plural. Some pronouns (first and second person) have dual number in addition to singular and plural. The nouns have three grammatical genders - masculine, feminine or neuter - and adjectives and pronouns are declined to match the gender of nouns. The genitive is used partitively, and quite often in compounds and kennings (e.g.: Urðarbrunnr, the well of Urðr; Lokasenna, the giging of Loki). Most declensions (of nouns and pronouns) use -a as a regular genitive plural ending, and all declensions use -um as their dative plural ending.

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
