Hamlet kills Polonius by mistake, so the Claudius sends him to England to be murdered. Ophelia goes mad because her father is dead, then she drowns in a river. Hamlet survives the plot to take his life. He returns England. Ophelia's brother Laertes challenges Hamlet to a duel, but he poisons the sword. Claudius also poisons some wine for Hamlet, but the queen drinks it instead. As a rhetorical device, apophasis can serve several purposes. For example, It can be employed to raise an ad hominem or otherwise controversial attack while disclaiming responsibility for it, as in, "I refuse to discuss the rumor that my opponent is a drunk."
