The gene carried by this virus was later discovered to closely resemble a normal cellular gene found in many animals. From this, it was deduced that the virus had captured this cellular gene at some point in its evolutionary history. Once incorporated, the gene gave the virus the capability to disrupt normal cell growth, turning it into an oncovirus. Incorporation of cellular genes happens regularly in retroviruses; when a key regulatory gene such as HRAS is incorporated, it may become oncogenic as the virus continues to evolve. These conditions involve both the host species and the tumors being transferred. These typically include low genetic diversity among individuals, an effective physical and environmental transport system, and a high enough dose of infective material. The cancers that reproduce faster in larger quantities with different means of reproduction tend to be favored for transmission if host conditions are met. Transmissible cancers follow the general pattern of cancer spread, starting with the growth of primary cancer cells at tumor sites followed by invasion of surrounding tissue and subsequent spread throughout the organism. A 2020 study of 2,658 samples from 38 different types of cancer found that 16% were associated with a virus. These cancers might be easily prevented through vaccination (e.g., papillomavirus vaccines), diagnosed with simple blood tests, and treated with less-toxic antiviral compounds. 2196bd8625

With the letters RNA removed, it now refers to any virus with a DNA or RNA genome causing cancer and is synonymous with tumor virus or cancer virus. EMC is a biphasic neoplasm of the salivary glands that exhibits well-defined tubules composed of two distinct cell types. The outer layer consists of myoepithelial cells with clear cytoplasm, encircling an inner layer of eosinophilic cuboidal epithelial cells, which resemble intercalated ducts. Its characteristic tubular growth pattern reflects this phenotype, supporting the presumed idea that the tumor originates from the intercalated ducts of the salivary glands. 2196bd8625

In 1872, Moritz Kaposi described a blood vessel tumor (originally called "idiopathic multiple pigmented sarcoma of the skin") that has since been eponymously named Kaposi's sarcoma (KS). KS was at first thought to be an uncommon tumor of Jewish and Mediterranean populations until it was later determined to be extremely common throughout sub-Saharan African populations. This led to the first suggestions in the 1950s that this tumor might be caused by a virus. With the onset of the AIDS epidemic in the early 1980s, there was a sudden resurgence of KS affecting AIDS patients, with up to 50% of reported AIDS patients having this tumor—an

Epithelial-myoepithelial carcinoma HRAS Epithelial-myoepithelial carcinoma is thought to be of intercalated duct origin. They are thought to participate in the formation of primary saliva. The intercalated ducts are small ducts in the salivary gland that assist in connecting the secretory cells to larger striated ducts. This is the first part of the exocrine gland ductal system in salivary glands, lined with cuboidal epithelium. Myoepithelial cells are thought to line the basal side of these ducts. Except for classic KS where there is generally no immune suppression, KS is caused by a combination of immune suppression (such as HIV/AIDS) and infection by Human herpesvirus 8 (HHV8 - also called KS-associated herpesvirus (KSHV)). The skin lesions are usually painless, purple, and may be flat or raised. Lesions can occur singly, multiply in a limited area, or may be widespread. Kaposi's sarcoma (KS) is a type of cancer that can form masses on the skin, in lymph nodes, in the mouth, or in other organs. Where the cancer has not metastasised (spread to other organs) or burrowed deeper into the tissues of the kidney, the five-year survival rate is 65-90%, but this is lowered considerably when the cancer has spread. 2196bd8625

Classic, endemic, immunosuppression therapy-related (also known as iatrogenic), and epidemic (also known as AIDS-related) sub-types are all described. Classic KS tends to affect older men in regions where KSHV is highly prevalent (Mediterranean, Eastern Europe, Middle East), is usually slow-growing, and most often affects only the legs. Endemic KS is most common in Sub-Saharan Africa and is more aggressive in children, while older adults present similarly to classic KS.
