Expert elicitation is essentially a scientific consensus methodology. Such words can mean very different things to In science, engineering, and research, expert elicitation is the synthesis of opinions of authorities of a subject where there is uncertainty due to insufficient data or when such data is unattainable because of physical constraints or lack of resources. Expert elicitation allows for parametrization, an "educated guess", for the respective topic under study. Expert elicitation generally helps quantify uncertainty

MoE always has the following components, but they are implemented and combined differently according to the problem being solved: The Māori alphabet includes both long and short vowels, which change the meaning of words. Vaudeville tradition holds that words with the /k/ sound are funny. == Basic theory ==

Weasel words can also be used to weaken or understate a controversial claim in order to provide a hedge against negative feedback. An example of this is using terms like "somewhat" or "in most respects", which make a sentence more ambiguous than it would be without them.

== History ==
