The original range of *C. lyoni* is unknown. They have been introduced into other parts of the world accidentally and are now pantropical in distribution. 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Crane fly Two other families of flies, the phantom crane flies (Ptychopteridae) and primitive crane flies (Tanyderidae), have similar common names due to their similar appearance. "Winter crane flies", members of the family Trichoceridae, are sufficiently different from the typical crane flies of Tipuloidea to be excluded from the superfamily Tipuloidea, and are placed as their sister group within Tipulomorpha. flies, and gadflies, are flies of the family Oestridae. *Dermatobia hominis* is the only species of botfly known to parasitize humans routinely, though other species of flies cause myiasis in humans. Their larvae are internal parasites of mammals, some species growing in the host's flesh and others within the gut. bot fly, bott fly or bot-fly in various combinations, is any fly in the family Oestridae

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Flies have a mobile head, with a pair of large compound eyes, and mouthparts designed either for piercing and sucking (in mosquitoes, black flies, and robber flies) or for lapping and sucking (in the other groups). Their wing arrangement gives them great manoeuvrability in flight, and claws and pads on their feet enable them to cling to smooth surfaces. Flies undergo complete metamorphosis; the eggs are

often laid on the larval food-source and the larvae, which lack true limbs, develop in a protected environment, often inside their food source. Other species are ovoviviparous, opportunistically depositing hatched or hatching larvae, instead of eggs, on carrion, dung, decaying material, or open wounds of mammals. In other species, the larvae are insectivores, preying on aphids, thrips, and other plant-sucking insects. Mosquitoes, the Culicidae, are a family of small flies consisting of 3,600 species. The group diversified during the Cretaceous period. Medical parasitologists view mosquitoes as vectors of disease, carrying protozoan parasites or bacterial or viral pathogens from one host to another. Mosquitoes, the Culicidae, are a family of small flies consisting of 3,600 species. All mosquitoes drink nectar from flowers; females of many species have adapted to also drink blood. Mosquitoes have a slender, segmented body, one pair of wings, three pairs of long hair-like legs, and a specialized, highly elongated, proboscis, adapted for piercing and sucking. Evolutionary biologists view mosquitoes as micropredators, small animals that parasitise

larger ones by drinking their blood without immediately killing them

Family Cylindrotomidae (Cylindrotomid or long-bodied crane flies, 67 species) Some species of damselfly have elaborate courtship behaviours. Many species are sexually dimorphic, the males often being more brightly coloured... Family Tipulidae (Large crane flies, 4,351 species) The name Chironomidae stems from the Ancient Greek word kheironómos, "a pantomimist". All damselflies are predatory insects: both nymphs and adults actively hunt and eat other insects. The nymphs are aquatic, with different species living in a variety of freshwater habitats including acidic bogs, ponds, lakes and rivers. The nymphs moult repeatedly, at the last moult climbing out of the

water to undergo metamorphosis. The skin splits down the back, they emerge and inflate their wings and abdomen to gain their adult form. Bibionidae Adults are nectar feeders and emerge in numbers in spring. Because of the likelihood of adult flies being found in copula, they have earned colloquial names such as "love bugs" or "honeymoon flies". Bibio do not eat, but subsist solely on the food taken in during the larval stage and drop steadily when in flight until they are a few inches above the ground. Bibionidae (March flies) is a family of flies (Diptera) containing approximately 650-700 species worldwide.

Damselfly Adult damselflies catch and eat flies, mosquitoes, and other small insects. Often they hover among grasses and low. Damselflies are flying insects of the suborder Zygoptera in the order Odonata. They are similar to dragonflies (which constitute the other odonatan suborder, Epiprocta) but are

usually smaller and have slimmer bodies. of damselflies placed in 309 genera. Damselflies have existed since the Late Jurassic, and are found on every continent except Antarctica. Most species fold the wings along the body when at rest, unlike dragonflies which hold the wings flat and away from the body 574f65cde6

The word "bot" in this sense means a maggot. A warble is a skin lump or callus such as might be caused by an ill-fitting harness, or by the presence of a warble fly maggot under the skin.
