

# How Long Do Ticks Live Off A Host

**Ixodes holocyclus** Ticks hatch as six-legged larvae after an incubation period of 40 to 60 days. It can cause paralysis by injecting neurotoxins into its host. Because the same area includes Australia's most densely populated regions, bites on people, pets and livestock are relatively common. is a "three-host tick". It is usually found in a 20-kilometre wide band following the eastern coastline of Australia. Within that range, *Ixodes holocyclus* is the tick most frequently encountered by humans and their pets. There are six major parasitic strategies of exploitation of animal hosts, namely parasitic castration, directly transmitted parasitism (by contact), trophically-transmitted parasitism (by being eaten), vector-transmitted parasitism, parasitoidism, and micropredation. One major axis of classification concerns invasiveness: an endoparasite lives inside the host's body; an ectoparasite lives outside, on the host's surface. Paralysis ticks are found in many types of habitat, particularly areas of high rainfall such as wet sclerophyll forest and temperate rainforest. The natural hosts for the paralysis tick include koalas, bandicoots, possums and kangaroos.

**Flea** Flea larvae are worm-like, with no limbs; they have chewing mouthparts and feed on organic debris left on their hosts' skin. Their claws keep them from being dislodged, and their mouthparts are adapted for piercing skin and sucking blood. They lack wings; their hind legs are extremely well adapted for jumping. Some species can leap 50 times their body length, a feat second only to jumps made by another group of insects, the superfamily of froghoppers. Fleas live by ingesting the blood of their hosts. small flightless insects that live as external parasites of mammals and birds. Adult fleas grow to about 3 millimetres (1/8 inch) long, are usually dark in color, and have bodies that are "flattened" sideways or narrow, enabling them to move through their hosts' fur or feathers. **Tick** Adult ticks are approximately 3 to 5 mm in length depending on age, sex, and species, but can become larger when engorged. Ticks are widely distributed around the world, especially in warm, humid climates. Ticks are external parasites, living by feeding on the blood of mammals, birds, and sometimes reptiles and amphibians. *Nuttalliella*, a genus of tick from southern Ticks are parasitic arachnids of the order Ixodida. Ticks belong to two major families: the Ixodidae, or hard ticks, and the Argasidae, or soft ticks. The most common sign of infection is an expanding red rash, known as erythema migrans (EM), which appears at the site of the tick bite about a week afterwards. The rash is typically neither itchy nor painful. Approximately 70–80% of infected people develop a rash. Other early symptoms may include fever, headaches and tiredness. If untreated, symptoms may include loss of the ability to move one or both sides of the face, joint pains, severe headaches with neck stiffness or heart palpitations.
