== Overview == Crying may elicit the Valsalva reflex. This reflex negatively impacts sucking pressures and results in poor feeding. The cortisol levels will rise along with blood pressure. Baby sign Writing on the topic, Jane Collingwood states that "Infants from about Baby sign, or baby signing, is the use of manual signing allowing infants and toddlers to communicate emotions, desires, and objects prior to spoken language development. These gestures are taught in conjunction with speech to hearing children, and are not the same as a sign language. motion in conjunction with a word which allows greater communication for infants. Some common benefits that have been found through the use of baby sign programs include an increased parent-child bond and communication, decreased frustration, and improved self-esteem for both the parent and child. Researchers have found that baby sign neither benefits nor harms the language development of infants. With guidance and encouragement, signing develops from a natural stage in infant development known as gesture. Promotional products and ease of information access have increased the attention that baby sign receives, making it pertinent that caregivers become educated before making the decision to use baby sign

SIDS Diagnosis requires that the death remain unexplained even after a thorough autopsy and detailed death scene investigation. The syndrome applies only to infants under Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), sometimes known as cot death or crib death, is the sudden, unexplained death of a child of less than one year of age. There is usually no noise or

evidence of struggle. m. , or when the baby is sleeping. SIDS remains one of the leading causes of infant mortality in Western countries, constituting almost 1/3 of all post-neonatal deaths. SIDS usually occurs between the hours of midnight and 9:00 a. more common in boys than girls. Rates of SIDS have decreased by up to 80% in areas with "Safe to Sleep" campaigns

The exact cause of SIDS is unknown. The requirement of a combination of factors including a specific underlying susceptibility, a specific time in development, and an environmental stressor has been proposed. These environmental stressors may include sleeping on the stomach or side, overheating, and exposure to tobacco smoke. Accidental suffocation from bed sharing (also known as co-sleeping) or soft objects may also play a role. Another risk factor is being born before 37 weeks of gestation. Between 1% and 5% of SIDS cases are estimated to be misidentified infanticides caused by intentional suffocation. SIDS makes up about 80% of sudden...

Well over 200 virus strains are implicated in causing the common cold, with enteroviruses (especially rhinoviruses), coronaviruses, and adenoviruses being the most common. They spread through the air or indirectly through contact with objects in the environment, followed by transfer to the mouth or nose. Risk factors include going to child care facilities, not sleeping well, and psychological stress. The symptoms are mostly due to the body's immune response to the infection rather than to tissue destruction by the viruses themselves. The symptoms...

Miles includes his definition of the common cold as, "an illness caused by a virus that infects the upper respiratory tract and, in most cases, clears up within a matter of days or possibly weeks without requiring medical intervention." He includes SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes COVID-19) in this definition.
