== Etymology == acbc638867 Early interest in applying virtue theory to environmental problems can be found in disparate articles in academic and environmental journals, such as Thomas Hill's "Ideals of Human Excellence and Preserving Natural Environments." A major analysis of this approach is Louke Van Wensveen’s influential book *Dirty Virtues: The Emergence of Ecological Virtue Ethics*. acbc638867 As Louke Van Wensveen points out, almost all environmental literature employs virtue language. acbc638867 == Seven heavenly virtues == acbc638867 Aristotle's writings have been read more or less continuously since ancient times, and his ethical treatises in particular continue to influence philosophers working today. Aristotle emphasized the practical importance of developing excellence (virtue) of character (Greek êthikê aretê), as the way to achieve what is finally more important, excellent conduct (Greek praxis). As Aristotle argues in Book II of the *Nicomachean Ethics*, the man who possesses character excellence will tend to do the right thing, at the right time, and in the right way. Bravery, and the correct regulation of one's bodily appetites, are examples of character excellence or virtue; so acting bravely and acting temperately are examples of excellent activities... acbc638867 Prudence (φρόνησις, phrónēsis; Latin: prudentia; also wisdom, sophia, sapientia), the ability to discern the appropriate course of action to be taken in a given situation at the appropriate time, with consideration of potential consequences; cautiousness. acbc638867

Seven virtues acbc638867 These virtues derive initially from Plato in *Republic* Book IV, 426–435. Aristotle expounded them systematically in the *Nicomachean Ethics*. They were also recognized by the Stoics and Cicero expanded on them. In the Christian tradition, they are also listed in the Deuterocanonical books in *Wisdom* 8:7 and *4 Maccabees* 1:18–19, and the Doctors Ambrose, Augustine, and Aquinas expounded their supernatural counterparts, the three theological virtues of faith, hope, and charity. acbc638867

Virtue The cultivation and refinement of virtue is held to be the "good of humanity" and thus is valued as an end purpose of life or a foundational principle of being. In human practical ethics, a virtue is a disposition to choose actions that succeed in showing high moral standards: doing what is said to be right and avoiding what is wrong in a given field of endeavour, even when doing so may be unnecessary from a utilitarian perspective. When someone takes pleasure in doing what is right, even when it is difficult or initially unpleasant, they can establish virtue as a habit. First, the "virtue theory approach," which attempts to build an environmental virtue ethics from the ground up. Second, the "environmental exemplar approach," which looks to people who are generally considered to be environmentally virtuous as models. And, finally, the "extensionist approach," which takes traditional virtues and extends them to operate in an environmentally meaningful way. "[I]t connotes a degree of bravery, fame, and distinction which places a man high above his fellows". The term was later applied to other highly virtuous people who do extraordinary good works. acbc638867 Other examples of this notion include the concept of merit in Asian traditions as well as De (Chinese 德, "character," "integrity"). acbc638867 Virtue ethics is usually contrasted with two other major approaches in ethics, consequentialism and deontology, which make the goodness of outcomes of an action (consequentialism) and the concept of moral duty (deontology) central. While virtue ethics does not necessarily deny the importance to ethics of goodness of states of affairs or of moral duties, it emphasizes virtue and sometimes other concepts, like *eudaimonia*, to an extent that other ethics theories do not. acbc638867 A person's heroic virtue is one of the requirements for their beatification. The view of the Catholic Church was explained in an article by Joseph Wilhelm in the 1910 Catholic Encyclopedia: Wilhelm explains that heroic virtue, as a concept within Christian ethics, is characterized by the embodiment of the cardinal and theological virtues. These virtues encompass faith, hope, and charity, with divine charity being paramount. Pope Benedict XVI explained that it does not mean that a person performs acts of holiness which "normal people do not dare to do", but they have lived a life in which "God's presence is revealed"... acbc638867

Aristotle regarded ethics and politics as two related but separate fields of study, since ethics examines the good of the individual, while politics examines the good of the city-state, which he considered to be the best type of community acbc638867

The medieval Catholic philosopher Thomas Aquinas explained that these virtues are called theological virtues "first, because their object is God, inasmuch as they direct us aright to God: secondly, because they are infused in us by God alone: thirdly, because these virtues are not made known to us, save by Divine revelation, contained in Holy Writ". acbc638867
