It is commonly used for muscle relaxation. It is also a method of heating tissue electromagnetically for therapeutic purposes in medicine. Diathermy is used in physical therapy to deliver moderate heat directly to pathologic lesions in the deeper tissues of the body. Surgically, the extreme heat that can be produced by diathermy may be used to destroy neoplasms, warts, and infected tissues, and to cauterize blood vessels to prevent excessive bleeding. For example, deep palpation and percussion are non-invasive but a

rectal examination is invasive. There are many non-invasive procedures, ranging from simple observation, to specialised forms of surgery, such as radiosurgery. Radionics Bio Electro Magnetics Radionics—also called electromagnetic therapy (EMT) and the Abrams method—is a form of alternative medicine that claims that disease can be diagnosed and treated by applying electromagnetic radiation (EMR), such as radio waves, to the body from an electrically powered device. “Therapeutic effects of whole-body devices applying pulsed electromagnetic fields (PEMF): A systematic literature review” (2011). It is similar to magnet therapy, which also applies EMR to the body but uses a magnet that generates a static electromagnetic field

Neuromodulation (medicine) Repetitive transcranial magnetic stimulation (rTMS), Transcranial pulsed electromagnetic fields (tPEMF), Transcranial direct current stimulation (tDCS), Transcranial Neuromodulation is "the alteration of nerve activity through targeted delivery of a stimulus, such as electrical stimulation or chemical agents, to specific neurological sites in the body". The most clinical experience has been with electrical stimulation. It is carried out to normalize – or modulate – nervous tissue function. Neuromodulation is an evolving therapy that can involve a range of electromagnetic stimuli, such as a magnetic field (rTMS), an electric current, or a drug delivered directly into the subdural space (intrathecal drug delivery). Emerging applications involve targeted introduction of genes or gene regulators and light (optogenetics), and by 2014, these

had been at minimum demonstrated in mammalian models, or first-in-human data had been acquired

Several systematic reviews have shown radionics is no more effective than placebo and falls into the category of pseudoscience.

The figure below shows an example of a generalized pulsed radio frequency waveform as seen with an oscilloscope with an antenna probe. In this example there are 1000 pulses per second (one kilohertz pulse rate) with a gated pulse width of 42 μ s. The pulse packet frequency in this example is 27.125 MHz of RF energy. The duty cycle for a pulsed radio frequency is the percent time the RF packet is on, 4.2% for this example ($[0.042 \text{ ms} \times 1000 \text{ pulses divided by } 1000 \text{ ms/s}] \times 100$). The pulse packet form can be a square, triangle, sawtooth or sine wave. In several applications of pulse radio frequency, such as radar, times between pulses can be modulated. Beginning around 1909, Albert Abrams (1864–1924) began to claim that he could detect "energy frequencies" in his patients' bodies. The idea was that a healthy person will have certain... Similarly to electromagnetic fields, the application of vacuum, in this therapy adopted with negative pressure between 8 and 16 hundredths of Bar, has shown considerable effectiveness... Radio frequencies at non-ablation energy levels are commonly used as a part of aesthetic treatments that can tighten skin, reduce fat by lipolysis and also apoptosis, or promote healing. The concept behind radionics originated with two books published by American physician Albert Abrams in 1909 and 1910. Over the next decade, Abrams became a millionaire by leasing EMT machines, which he designed himself. This so-called treatment contradicts the principles of physics and biology and therefore is widely considered pseudoscientific. The United States Food and Drug Administration does not recognize any legitimate medical use for radionic devices. The field of neurointegration therapy is relatively new and protocols have not been widely standardized. However, global initiatives are being taken to create a common language of information, to promote

consistency in education and certification, and to form collaborative alliances with other mental and physical health disciplines... 9e83a2d0b9 Neurointegration therapy begins with a brain mapping session using qEEG to help visualize areas of dysregulation within the brain. The supporting therapies are then used to retrain the problem areas of the brain by rewarding the brainwaves when they move in a desired pattern.
