Prevention includes avoiding risk factors and HPV vaccination. Standard treatment may include radiation therapy, chemotherapy, and surgery. About 10,930 people are diagnosed a year in the United States, representing about 0.5% of new cancers. Onset is typically after the age of 45. Women are affected more often than men. Factors that increase the risk include the use of public showers and pools, working with meat, eczema, and a weak immune system. The virus is believed to infect the host through the entrance of a skin wound. A number of types exist, including plantar warts, "filiform warts", and genital warts. They may be flat or project out from the surface of the skin, and their color may vary; brownish, white, pale yellow, pinkish-red, or gray. They can be itchy and feel burning. There may be a few individual warts or several, either in a cluster or merged together to look cauliflower-shaped. effective at preventing infection of males than of females. There are currently more than 100 different strains of HPV, half of which can cause genital infections. Although it is not usually the HPV strains that cause genital warts associated with the oropharyngeal cancers, they have transmitted the same way through oral-genital sexual contact, and consumers should protect themselves accordingly and adhere to routine health and dental screening schedule to monitor and maintain their health status. Many people with HPV do not develop any symptoms but can still infect others through sexual contact. Symptoms may include warts on the genitals or surrounding skin. There's no cure for the virus and warts may go away on their own. Treatment focuses on removing the warts. A vaccine that prevents infection with the HPV strains most likely to cause genital warts and cervical cancer is recommended for boys and girls. 79d51e2ecb == Signs and symptoms == 79d51e2ecb CIN most commonly occurs at the squamocolumnar junction of the cervix, a transitional area between the squamous epithelium of the vagina and the columnar epithelium of the endocervix. The signs and symptoms of oropharyngeal cancer may include: HPV types 6 and 11 are responsible for causing majority of genital warts whereas HPV types 16, 18, 31, 33, and 35 are also occasionally found. It is spread through direct skin-to-skin contact, usually during oral, manual, vaginal, or anal sex with an infected partner. Diagnosis is generally based on symptoms and can be confirmed by biopsy. The types of HPV that cause cancer are not the same as those that cause warts. Over 200 types of HPV have been described. An individual can become infected with more than one type of HPV and the disease is only known to affect humans. More than 40 types may be spread through sexual contact and infect the anus and genitals. Risk factors for persistent infection by sexually transmitted types include early age of first sexual intercourse, multiple sexual partners, smoking... HPV-positive OPC presents in one of four ways: as an asymptomatic abnormality in the mouth found by the patient or a health professional such as a dentist; with local symptoms such as pain or infection at the site of the tumor; with difficulties of speech, swallowing, and/or...

HPV vaccination in Japan The programme has been marked by the introduction of routine immunization in 2013, an eight-year suspension of proactive recommendations (2013–2021) amid safety concerns, and subsequent recovery. Those who begin vaccination before age 15 generally receive two doses, while those who begin at age 15 or older receive three doses. HPV vaccination in Japan refers to the routine immunization programme, mandated under national law but funded and administered by municipal governments HPV vaccination in Japan refers to the routine immunization programme, mandated under national law but funded and administered by municipal governments, to prevent cervical cancer and other HPV-related diseases. It is routinely offered to girls from the equivalent of sixth grade of elementary school through the first year of high school, with vaccination provided free of charge under the national immunization programme through municipalities. Since April 2026, the 9-valent vaccine Gardasil 9 has been the only HPV vaccine used in the routine programme in Japan

HPV-positive oropharyngeal cancer Risk factors include having a large number of sexual partners, a history of oral-genital sex or anal–oral sex, having a female partner with a history of either an abnormal Pap smear or cervical dysplasia, having chronic periodontitis, and, among men, younger age at first intercourse and a history of genital warts. In the past, cancer of the oropharynx (throat) was associated with the use of alcohol or tobacco or both, but the majority of cases are now associated with the HPV virus, acquired by having oral contact with the genitals (oral-genital sex) of a person who has a genital HPV infection. Most cases of CIN either remain stable or are eliminated by the person's immune system without need for intervention. However... The resulting reduction is projected to lead to thousands of additional cervical cancer cases and deaths... Human papillomavirus (HPV) infection is necessary for the development of CIN, but not all with this infection develop cervical cancer. Many women with HPV infection never develop CIN or cervical cancer. Typically, HPV resolves on its own. However, those with an HPV infection that lasts more than one or two years have a higher risk of developing a higher grade of CIN.

Human papillomavirus infection papillomavirus infection (HPV infection) is an infection caused by a DNA virus from the Papillomaviridae family. These lesions, depending on the site affected, increase the risk of cancer of the cervix, vulva, vagina, penis, anus, mouth, tonsils, or throat. Many HPV infections cause no symptoms and 90% resolve spontaneously within two years. Nearly all cervical cancer is due to HPV and two strains, HPV16 and HPV18, account for 70% of all cases. HPV6 and HPV11 are common causes of genital warts and laryngeal papillomatosis. Sometimes an HPV infection persists and results in warts or precancerous lesions. Between 60% and 90% of the other cancers listed above are also linked to HPV. HPV16 is responsible for almost 90% of HPV-related cancers of the mouth, throat, or tonsils

Oropharyngeal cancer is diagnosed by biopsy of observed abnormal tissue in the throat. Oropharyngeal cancer is staged according to the appearance of the abnormal cells on the biopsy coupled with the dimensions and the extent of the abnormal cells found. Treatment is with surgery, chemotherapy, or radiation therapy, or some combination of those treatments.

Without treatment, most types of warts resolve in months to years. Several treatments may speed resolution, including salicylic acid applied to the skin and cryotherapy. In those who are otherwise healthy, they do not typically result in significant problems. Treatment of genital warts differs from that of other types. Infection with a virus, such as HIV, can cause warts. This is prevented through careful handling of needles or sharp objects that could infect the individual through physical trauma of the skin, plus the practice of safe sex using barrier... HPV vaccine They also protect against penile cancer. All of them protect against HPV types 16 and 18, which are together responsible for approximately 70% of cervical cancer cases globally. The nonavalent one provides additional protection against HPV types 31, 33, 45, 52 and 58. The quadrivalent vaccines provide additional protection against HPV types 6 and 11. They additionally prevent genital warts (also known as anogenital warts), with the quadrivalent and nonavalent vaccines providing virtually complete protection. It is estimated that HPV vaccines may prevent 70% of cervical cancer, 80% of anal cancer, 60% of vaginal cancer, 40% of vulvar cancer, and show more than 90% effectiveness in preventing HPV-positive oropharyngeal cancers. All have excellent safety profiles and are highly efficacious, or have met immunobridging standards. Currently there are six licensed HPV vaccines: three bivalent (protect against two types of HPV), two quadrivalent (against four), and one nonavalent vaccine (against nine).
