Following the 1881 assassination of Alexander II of Russia and the resulting surge of antisemitic pogroms in the Russian Empire, the largest wave of Jewish immigration to the United States took place, driving the Jewish population rose from about 80,000 in 1880 to 1.5 million in 1920. Dutch and Huguenot colonists settled in the area in the 17th century, centered on a Dutch settlement named Waghackamack and later renamed to Minisink. The settlement was part of the boundary dispute between New York and New Jersey, which began circa 1700 and was not resolved until 1773. During the American Revolution, the area was raided twice by Mohawk Leader, Joseph Brant. The more impactful of the raids took place on July 20, 1779, causing mass destruction in the town and leading to the Battle of Minisink. b5d2c90e38
