Bell's palsy They may include muscle twitching, weakness, or total loss of the ability to move one or, in rare cases, both sides of the face. Symptoms can vary from mild to severe. Typically symptoms come on over 48 hours. Bell's palsy can trigger an increased sensitivity to sound known as hyperacusis. In most cases, the weakness is temporary and significantly improves over weeks. conditions that can cause facial weakness include brain tumor, stroke, Ramsay Hunt syndrome type 2, myasthenia gravis, and Lyme disease. Other symptoms include drooping of the eyebrow, a change in taste, and pain around the ear. Onset of symptoms usually occurs in early adulthood and is characterized by intention tremor, progressive ataxia, convulsions, and myoclonic epileptic jerks. 0cef587085 It has also been alternatively called dyssynergia cerebellaris myoclonica, dyssynergia cerebellaris progressiva, dentatorubral degeneration, or Ramsay Hunt cerebellar syndrome. 0cef587085 The cause of Bell's palsy is unknown and it can occur at any age. Risk factors include diabetes, a recent upper respiratory tract infection, and pregnancy. It results from a dysfunction of cranial nerve VII (the facial nerve). Many believe that this is due to a viral infection that results in swelling. Diagnosis is based on a person's appearance and ruling out other possible causes. Other conditions that can cause facial weakness include brain tumor, stroke, Ramsay Hunt syndrome type 2, myasthenia gravis, and Lyme disease. 0cef587085 GN is rare, and only limited data is available regarding the incidence, prevalence, and risk factors associated with this condition. Middle-aged adults, however, seem to be predominantly affected, women more than men. 0cef587085

It is not a causal or pathologically distinct entity but a generic term for chorea of any cause starting during pregnancy. It mostly occurs in young patients; the average age is 22 years 0cef587085

The immunoglobulin is prepared from the plasma of healthy donors with high titers of antibodies to VZV. Hiccups are a kind of myoclonic jerk specifically affecting the diaphragm. When a spasm is triggered by an external stimulus, it is known as a provoked spasm. Dyssynergia can be caused by disruption or damage between the cerebellum and the sacral spinal cord. Damage to the spinal cord can be caused by injury or acquired through hereditary means such as myelodysplasia. Preherpetic neuralgia N; Cohrs Preherpetic neuralgia is a form of nerve pain (neuralgia) specifically associated with a Shingles (herpes zoster) viral infection. In addition, most brain damage to the cerebellum will cause dyssynergia. The cerebellum is split into three separate parts: the archicerebellum (controls equilibrium and helps to move the eye, head and neck), midline vermis (helps to move lower body), and lateral hemisphere (control of arms and quick movements). Ramsay Hunt syndrome type 2 Ramsay Hunt syndrome type 2, commonly referred to simply as Ramsay Hunt syndrome (RHS) and also known as herpes zoster oticus, is inflammation of the geniculate Ramsay Hunt syndrome type 2, commonly referred to simply as Ramsay Hunt syndrome (RHS) and also known as herpes zoster oticus, is inflammation of the geniculate ganglion of the facial nerve as a late consequence of varicella zoster virus (VZV). Therapy aims to shorten its overall length, while also providing pain relief and averting any consequences. In regard to the frequency, less than 1% of varicella zoster infections involve the facial nerve and result in RHS. It is more complicated than Bell's palsy. It is common for diagnoses to be overlooked or delayed, which can raise the likelihood of long-term consequences. Due to its proximity to the vestibulocochlear nerve, the virus can spread and cause hearing loss, tinnitus (hearing noises that are not caused by outside sounds), and vertigo. It is traditionally defined as a triad of ipsilateral facial paralysis, otalgia, and vesicles close to the ear and auditory canal 0cef587085

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
