If the body is unable to maintain a normal temperature and it increases significantly above normal, a condition known as hyperthermia occurs. Humans may experience lethal hyperthermia when the wet bulb temperature is sustained above 35 °C (95 °F) for six hours. Work in 2022 established by experiment that a wet-bulb temperature exceeding 30.55 °C caused uncompensable heat stress in young, healthy adult humans. The opposite condition, when body temperature decreases below normal levels, is known as hypothermia. It results when the homeostatic control mechanisms of heat within the body malfunction... 5ffb64533d The technique reached its peak of sophistication in the early 20th century with malariotherapy, in which *Plasmodium vivax*, a causative agent of malaria, was allowed to infect already ill patients in order to produce intense fever for therapeutic ends. The sophistication of this approach lay in using effective anti-malarial drugs to control the *P. vivax* infection, while maintaining the fever it causes to the detriment of other, ongoing, and then-incurable infections present in the patient, such as late-stage syphilis. 2016 Angola and DR Congo yellow fever outbreak The outbreak was classified as an urban cycle of yellow fever transmission, which can spread rapidly. Moderators from ProMED-mail stressed the importance of initiating a vaccination campaign immediately to prevent further spread. The CDC classified the outbreak as Watch Level 2 (Practice Enhanced Precautions) on 7 April 2016. A preliminary finding that the strain of the yellow fever virus was closely related to a strain identified in a 1971 outbreak in Angola was confirmed in August 2016

The yellow fever outbreak had started by March 1878, and it was thought to be connected to an ongoing yellow fever outbreak in Havana. The mortality rate peaked in October before frost finally killed the mosquitoes and brought an end to the outbreak. By the end of September, 20,000 people had fled the city, including congressional and executive officials of the federal government of the United States. During the epidemic, 5,000 or more people died between August 1 and November 9. The vast majority of them died of yellow fever, making the epidemic in the city of 50,000 people, one of the most severe in United States history 5ffb64533d

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
