Timeline of Brexit As Euroscepticism increased during the early 2010s, Prime Minister David Cameron delivered a speech in January 2013 at Bloomberg London, in which he called for reform of the EU and promised an in-out referendum on the UK's membership if the Conservative Party won a majority at the 2015 general election. The Conservatives won 330 seats at the election, giving Cameron a majority of 12, and a bill to hold a referendum was introduced to Parliament that month. Following this, Eurosceptic groups grew in popularity in the UK, opposing aspects of both the EC and the EU. Britain entered the predecessor to the EU, the European Communities (EC), on 1 January 1973.
