End-of-life care can be provided in the hours, days, or months before a person dies and encompasses care and support for a person's mental and emotional needs, physical comfort, spiritual needs, and practical tasks b6dfcc86ed

End-of-life care is most commonly provided at home, in a hospital, or in a long-term care facility with care being provided by family members, nurses, social workers, physicians, and other support staff. Facilities may also have palliative or hospice care teams that will provide end-of-life care services. The practice of palliative sedation has been a topic of debate and controversy as many view In medicine, specifically in end-of-life care, palliative sedation (also known as terminal sedation, continuous deep sedation, or sedation for intractable distress of a dying patient) is the palliative practice of relieving distress in a terminally ill person in the last hours or days of a dying person's life, usually by means of a continuous intravenous or subcutaneous infusion of a sedative drug, or by means of a specialized catheter designed to provide comfortable and discreet administration of ongoing medications via the rectal route b6dfcc86ed

Hospice care in the United States Hospice care was introduced to the United States in the 1970s in response to the work of Cicely Saunders in the United Kingdom. These symptoms can be physical, emotional, spiritual, or social in nature. In such countries, the term hospice is more likely In the United States, hospice care is a type and philosophy of end-of-life care which focuses on the palliation of a terminally ill patient's symptoms. distinctions made between care of those with terminal illnesses

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and palliative care in a more general setting. This part of health care has expanded as people face a variety of issues with terminal illness. In the United States, it is distinguished by extensive use of volunteers and a greater emphasis on the patient's psychological needs in coming to terms with dying. The concept of hospice as a place to treat the incurably ill has been evolving since the 11th century b6dfcc86ed

Healthcare chaplaincy Healthcare chaplains. provision of pastoral care, spiritual care, or chaplaincy services in healthcare settings, such as hospitals, hospices, or home cares b6dfcc86ed

Under hospice, medical and social services are supplied to patients and their families by an interdisciplinary team of professional providers and volunteers, who take a patient-directed approach to managing illness. Generally, treatment is not diagnostic or curative, although the patient may choose some treatment options intended to prolong life, such as CPR. Most hospice services are covered by Medicare or other providers, and many hospices can provide access to charitable resources... b6dfcc86ed == Medical == b6dfcc86ed As of 2013, approximately tens of millions of people a year were unable to resolve their needs of physical, psychological, or spiritual suffering at their time of death. Due to the amount of pain a dying person may face, palliative care is considered important. Proponents claim palliative sedation can provide a more peaceful and ethical solution for such people. b6dfcc86ed

Palliative care The distinction between palliative care and hospice differs depending on the global context. In the United States, the term hospice refers specifically Palliative care (from Latin root palliare "to cloak") is an interdisciplinary medical care-giving approach aimed at optimizing quality of life and mitigating or reducing suffering among people with serious, complex, and often terminal illnesses. Many definitions of palliative care exist b6dfcc86ed

Sometimes palliative sedation results in only a light unconsciousness, in which the patient may still be somewhat aware of the presence of others. In other cases it results in a deep unconsciousness, like coma. b6dfcc86ed [A]n approach that improves the quality of life of patients and their families facing the problem associated with life-threatening illness, through the prevention

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and relief of suffering by means of early identification and impeccable assessment and treatment of pain and other problems, physical, psychosocial, and spiritual. Since the 1990s, many palliative care programs involved a disease-specific approach. However, as the field developed throughout the 2000s, the WHO began to take a broader patient-centered approach, suggesting that the principles of palliative care should be applied as early as possible to any chronic, ultimately fatal illness. This shift was important because if a disease-oriented approach is followed, the needs and preferences of the patient are not fully met and aspects of care, such as pain, quality of life,... b6dfcc86ed

Hospice care in the United States is largely defined by the practices of the Medicare system and other health insurance providers, which cover inpatient or at-home hospice care for patients with terminal diseases who are estimated to live six months or less. Hospice care under the Medicare Hospice Benefit requires documentation from two physicians estimating a person has less than six months to live if the disease follows its usual course. Hospice benefits include access to a multidisciplinary treatment team specialized in end-of-life care and can be accessed in the home, long-term care facility or the hospital. b6dfcc86ed
