

Analyze Grammatically As A Sentence

In English, a cleft sentence can be constructed as follows: In theories of syntax, a phrase is any group of words, or sometimes a single word, which plays a particular role within the syntactic structure... == Examples == Until the 20th century, publishing houses and printers in many countries used additional space between sentences. There were exceptions to this traditional spacing method – some printers used spacing between sentences that was no wider than word spacing. This was French spacing, synonymous with single-space sentence spacing until the late 20th century. With the introduction of the typewriter in the late 19th century, typists used two spaces between sentences to mimic the style used by traditional typesetters. While wide sentence spacing was phased out in the printing industry in the mid-20th century, the practice continued on typewriters and later on computers. Perhaps because of this, many modern sources now incorrectly claim that wide spacing was created for the typewriter. == Overview of ungrammaticality == Typically, in passive clauses, what is usually expressed by the object (or sometimes another argument) of the verb is now expressed by the subject, while what is usually expressed by the subject is either omitted or is indicated by some adjunct of the clause. Thus, turning an active sense of a verb into a passive sense is a valence-decreasing process ("detransitivizing process"), because it syntactically turns a transitive sense into an intransitive sense. This is not always the case; for example in Japanese a passive-voice construction does not necessarily decrease valence.

Diverse approaches, such as generative grammar and functional grammar, offer unique perspectives on syntax, reflecting its complexity and centrality to understanding human language

In logic, syntax is the study of how strings of symbols form well-formed formulas in formal languages. Since it was first proposed in 1952 by C. C. Fries, the distinguishing of function/structure words from content/lexical words has been highly influential in the grammar used in second-language acquisition and English-language teaching.

Garden-path sentence A garden-path sentence is a grammatically correct sentence that starts in such a way that a reader's most likely interpretation will be incorrect; the A garden-path sentence is a grammatically correct sentence that starts in such a way that a reader's most likely interpretation will be incorrect; the reader is lured into a parse that turns out to be a dead end or yields a clearly unintended meaning. In A Dictionary of Modern English Usage (1926), Fowler describes such sentences as unwittingly laying a "false scent". Garden path refers to the saying "to be led down [or up] the garden path", meaning to be deceived, tricked, or seduced

Phrase For instance, the English sentence "the squirrel is very happy" is a clause phrase which contains the noun phrase "the squirrel" and the verb phrase "is very happy". In theoretical linguistics, phrases are often analyzed as units of syntactic structure such as a constituent. In linguistics, these are known as phrasemes. Additionally, "very happy" is an adjective phrase. In common usage, a phrase is usually a group of words with some special idiomatic meaning or other significance, such as "all rights reserved", "economical with the truth", or "kick the bucket". Phrases can consist of a single word or a complete sentence. It can be used within a sentence, so this means that a phrase can be treated as a unit within a larger structure. It may be a euphemism, a saying or proverb, a fixed expression, a figure of speech, etc. a phrase — called an expression in some contexts — is a group of one or more words acting as a grammatical unit. For the sentence to be grammatical, the subject of the second clause must be a bare plural. Linguists have marked that it is "striking" that, despite the grammar of these sentences not possibly having a meaningful interpretation, people so often report that they sound acceptable, and that it is "remarkable" that people seldom notice any error.

Sentence spacing These include a normal word space (as between the words in a sentence), a single enlarged space, and two full spaces. Dictionaries define the specific meanings of content words but can describe only the general usages of function words. Passive voice This contrasts with active voice, in which the subject has the agent role. In a clause with passive voice, the grammatical subject expresses the theme or patient of the main verb – that is, the person or thing that undergoes the action or has its state changed. For example, in the sentence "Jack kicked the ball", Jack is the agent and the ball is the patient. In certain languages, the agent is declined or otherwise marked to indicate its grammatical role. Modern English does not mark the agentive grammatical role of a noun in a sentence. The word syntax comes from the ancient Greek word σύνταξις, meaning an orderly or systematic arrangement, which consists of σύν- (syn-, "together" or "alike"), and τάξις (táxis, "arrangement"). In Hellenistic Greek, this also specifically developed a use referring to the grammatical order of words, with a slightly altered spelling: συντάσσειν.
