Infection control and hospital epidemiology are akin to public health practice, practiced within the confines of a particular health-care delivery system rather than directed at society as a whole. In Northern Europe, infection prevention and control is expanded from healthcare into a component in public health, known as "infection protection" (smittevern, smittskydd, Infektionsschutz in the local languages). If soap and water are unavailable, hand sanitizer that is at least 60% (v/v) alcohol in water can be used as long as hands are not visibly excessively dirty or greasy. Meta-analyses have shown that regular hand washing in community settings can significantly reduce respiratory and gastrointestinal infections. These include the five critical times during the day where washing hands with soap is important to reduce fecal-oral transmission of disease: after using the toilet (for urination, defecation, menstrual hygiene), after cleaning a child's bottom (changing diapers), before feeding a child, before eating and before/after preparing food... A subsidiary aspect of infection control involves preventing the spread of antimicrobial-resistant organisms... Each of the four vignettes that make up People in Cages addresses different social issues, such as racism, and how people can become trapped by society. Although some of these issues are weighty, and each play is ultimately quite tragic, the plays themselves are laced with humour and comedy.
