In its original form it stands for Airway, Breathing, and Circulation. Since its development, the mnemonic has been extended and modified to fit the different areas in which it is used, with different versions changing the meaning of letters (such as from the original 'Circulation' to 'Compressions') or adding other letters (such as an optional "D" step for Disability or Defibrillation). The protocol was originally developed as a memory aid for rescuers performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and the most widely known use of the initialism is in the care of the unconscious or unresponsive patient, although it is also used as a reminder of the priorities for assessment and treatment of patients in many acute medical and trauma situations, from first-aid to hospital medical treatment 4685c29103

Victory Square was at one time the grounds of the city's provincial courthouse, which was torn down in 1911–1913 when the new Francis Rattenbury-designed courthouse on Georgia Street was opened (now the Vancouver Art Gallery). Non-heart-beating donation A stand-off period is observed after cessation of CPR to confirm that death Non-heart-beating donation (NHBD), or donation after circulatory death (DCD), is the process of organ donation for transplant in which organs are recovered from the donor after their circulation and breathing have stopped (circulatory death), as opposed to donation after death by neurological criteria (brain death). The majority of DCD donors are critical care patients who have a non-survivable injury and grave prognosis, whose legal next of kin has decided to remove life-sustaining therapies and allow for natural death. In DCD cases, prior to removing life-sustaining therapies, tests are done to assess viability of organs and to find matching recipients. cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is continued until the transplant team arrive. Cardiac arrest When the heart stops, blood cannot circulate properly through the body and the blood flow to the brain and other organs is decreased. Coma and persistent vegetative state may result from cardiac arrest. When the brain does not receive enough blood, this can cause a

person to lose consciousness and brain cells begin to die within minutes due to a lack of oxygen. Cardiac arrest is typically identified by the absence of a central pulse and abnormal or absent breathing. The Resuscitation Council in the United Kingdom stands in line with the Cardiac arrest, also known as sudden cardiac arrest (SCA), is a condition in which the heart suddenly and unexpectedly stops beating or beats in a way which fails to produce pulse. individuals to begin CPR on any unconscious person with absent or abnormal breathing 4685c29103

CPR involves chest compressions for adults between 5 cm (2.0 in) and 6 cm (2.4 in) deep and at a rate of at least 100 to 120 per minute. The rescuer may also provide artificial ventilation by either exhaling air into the subject's mouth or nose (mouth-to-mouth resuscitation) or using a device that pushes air into the subject's lungs (mechanical ventilation). Current recommendations emphasize early and high-quality chest compressions over artificial ventilation; a simplified CPR method involving only chest compressions is recommended for untrained rescuers. With children, however, 2015 American Heart Association guidelines indicate that doing only compressions may result in worse outcomes, because such problems in children normally arise from respiratory issues rather than from... 4685c29103
