Moca, Puerto Rico Maria struck Puerto Rico. Moca is spread over 12 barrios and Moca Pueblo (the downtown area and the administrative center). In Moca, landslides and the flooding of the Río Culebrinas caused major destruction to bridges, roads and homes. It is part of the Aguadilla-Isabela-San Sebastián Metropolitan Statistical Area. About 1300 homes Moca (Spanish pronunciation: ['moka]) is a barrio-pueblo and municipality of Puerto Rico, located in the north-western region of the island, north of Añasco; southeast of Aguadilla; east of Aguada; and west of Isabela and San Sebastián b7fed18fd9

The name comes from the Moca tree (*Andira inermis*) which are very common in this region. b7fed18fd9 == History == b7fed18fd9 The name Aguada is a shortening of the town's original name San Francisco de Asís de la Aguada. The word aguada literally translates to "watery" or "watered down" from Spanish, possibly a reference to the town's strategic importance as a port in the Mona Passage and the Atlantic Ocean. b7fed18fd9 The Moca tree was officially adopted as the representative tree of the town on February 19, 1972. Moca is famous for its Mundillo lace. Mundillo is a Puerto Rican-style of handmade bobbin lace. Mundillo almost synonymous with the small town of Moca. b7fed18fd9 In the 1860s, the government of Spain was involved in several conflicts across Latin America. It became involved in a war with Peru and Chile and had to address slave revolts in Cuba. At the time, Puerto Rico and Cuba also suffered a severe economic crisis because of increasing tariffs and taxes imposed by the Spanish central government on most import and export goods. The Spanish crown needed the funds badly to subsidize its troops in the Dominican Republic, which Spain had annexed in 1861, only to leaving in 1865 following the Dominican Restoration War. b7fed18fd9 In mid-19th century Puerto Rico, many supporters of independence from Spain, as well as others who... b7fed18fd9

Grito de Lares Three decades after its uprising in Lares, the committee carried out a second unsuccessful revolt in the neighboring southwestern municipality of Yauco, known as the Intentona de Yauco (Attempted Coup of Yauco). The Grito de Lares flag is recognized as the first flag of Puerto Rico. Revolutionary troops finally retreated to General Rojas's hacienda Grito de Lares (Cry of Lares),

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also referred to as the Lares revolt, or the Lares revolution, was the first short revolt against Spanish rule in Puerto Rico, staged by the Revolutionary Committee of Puerto Rico on September 23, 1868. rebels were pushed back to the other side of the bridge that crosses the Culebrinas River b7fed18fd9
