Adenoma is a benign tumor of glandular tissue, such as the mucosa of stomach, small intestine, and colon, in which tumor cells form glands or gland-like structures. 2ccf80e805 If it is attached by a narrow elongated stalk, it is said to be pedunculated; if it is attached without a stalk, it is said to be sessile. 2ccf80e805 Colorectal polyps are often classified by their behaviour (i.e. benign vs. malignant) or cause (e.g. as a consequence of inflammatory bowel disease). They may be benign (e.g. hyperplastic polyp), pre-malignant (e.g. tubular adenoma) or

malignant (e.g. colorectal adenocarcinoma).

Routine use of colonoscopy screening varies globally. This examination is performed using either a CCD camera or a fiber optic camera, which is mounted on a flexible tube and passed through the anus 2ccf80e805

Polyps are commonly found in the colon, stomach, nose, ear, sinus(es), urinary bladder, and uterus. They may also occur elsewhere in the body where there are mucous membranes, including the cervix, vocal folds, and small intestine 2ccf80e805

The American College of Gastroenterology has

recommended the abandoning of the guaiac fecal occult blood test (gFOBT) as a colorectal cancer screening tool, in favor of the fecal immunochemical test (FIT). The newer and recommended tests look for globin, DNA, or other blood factors including transferrin, while conventional stool guaiac tests look for heme. Relative incidences by location: Those with rectal bleeding may notice bright red blood in their stool. Symptoms associated with rectal bleeding include having several bowel movements in a day, feelings of incomplete rectal evacuation, straining, hard or lumpy stools, feelings of urgency, loose or watery stools, and leakage of bowel movement.

Adenoma Some adenomas are too small to be seen macroscopically but can still cause clinical symptoms. Adenomas can grow from many glandular organs, including the adrenal glands, pituitary gland, thyroid, prostate, and others. However, even though benign, they have the potential to cause serious health

complications by compressing other structures (mass effect) and by producing large amounts of hormones in an unregulated, non-feedback-dependent manner (causing paraneoplastic syndromes). Although adenomas are benign, they should be treated as pre-cancerous. Most adenomas do not transform. cancer, thereafter the best practice is to resume surveillance colonoscopy after 5-10 years rather than repeating it more frequently than the standard An adenoma is a benign tumor of epithelial tissue with glandular origin, glandular characteristics, or both. Over time adenomas may transform to become malignant, at which point they become adenocarcinomas. Some adenomas grow from epithelial tissue in nonglandular areas but express glandular tissue structure (as can happen in familial polyposis coli) 2ccf80e805

Colorectal cancer Signs and symptoms may include blood in the stool, a change in bowel movements, weight loss, abdominal pain, and fatigue. Dietary factors that increase the risk include red meat, processed meat, and alcohol. It typically starts as a benign tumor, often in the form of a polyp, which over time becomes cancerous. sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy. Some of the inherited genetic disorders that can cause colorectal cancer include familial adenomatous polyposis and hereditary non-polyposis colon cancer; however, these represent less than 5% of cases. Another risk factor is inflammatory bowel disease, which includes Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. This is then followed by medical imaging to determine whether the cancer has spread beyond the colon or is in situ. Risk factors include diet, obesity, smoking, and lack of physical activity. Most colorectal cancers are due to lifestyle factors and genetic disorders. Screening is effective Colorectal cancer, also known as bowel cancer, colon cancer, intestinal cancer, or rectal cancer, is the development of cancer from the colon or rectum (parts of the large intestine), in which uncontrolled growth of colon cells that can invade/spread to other parts of the body takes place 2ccf80e805

Colonoscopy surveys the entire colon, which runs 120 to 150 cm (4-5 ft). Sigmoidoscopy is similar, but only surveys the sigmoid colon, which comprises 60 cm of

the distal (left) side of the colon. The benefits of colonoscopy for cancer survival have primarily been associated with the detection of lesions in the distal portion of the colon. 2ccf80e805 Fecal occult blood testing (FOBT), as its name implies, aims to detect subtle blood loss in the gastrointestinal tract, anywhere from the mouth to the colon. Positive tests ("positive stool") may result from either upper gastrointestinal bleeding or lower gastrointestinal bleeding and warrant further investigation for peptic ulcers or a malignancy (such as colorectal cancer or gastric cancer). The test does not directly detect colon cancer but is often used in clinical screening for that disease. == Digestive polyps == 2ccf80e805 Some polyps are tumors (neoplasms) and others are non-neoplastic, for example hyperplastic or dysplastic, which are benign. The neoplastic ones are usually benign, although some can be pre-malignant, or concurrent

with a malignancy. Colorectal polyps are not usually associated with symptoms. When they occur, symptoms include bloody stools; changes in frequency or consistency of stools (such as a week or more of constipation or diarrhoea); and fatigue arising from blood loss. Anemia arising from iron deficiency can also present due to chronic blood loss, even in the absence of bloody stools. Another symptom may be an increased mucus production especially those involving villous adenomas. Copious production of mucus causes loss of potassium that can occasionally result in symptomatic hypokalemia. Occasionally, if a polyp is big enough to cause a bowel obstruction, there may be nausea, vomiting and severe constipation. Flexible sigmoidoscopy enables the physician to look at the inside of the large intestine from the rectum to the left side of the colon, called the sigmoid. Physicians may use the procedure to find the cause of diarrhea, abdominal pain, or constipation. They also use it to look for benign and malignant polyps, as well as early signs of cancer in the descending colon and rectum. With flexible sigmoidoscopy, the physician can see intestinal bleeding, inflammation, abnormal growths, and ulcers...

Sigmoidoscopy A sigmoidoscopy only examines up to the sigmoid, the most distal part of the colon, while colonoscopy examines the whole Sigmoidoscopy ("sigma", the Greek term for letter "s/ς" + "eidos" +

"scopy": namely, to look inside an "s"/"ç"-like object) is the minimally invasive medical examination of the large intestine from the rectum through to the nearest part of the colon, the sigmoid colon. There are two types of sigmoidoscopy: flexible sigmoidoscopy, which uses a flexible endoscope, and rigid sigmoidoscopy, which uses a rigid device. A sigmoidoscopy is similar to, but not the same as, a colonoscopy. Flexible sigmoidoscopy is generally the preferred procedure. A sigmoidoscopy only examines up to the sigmoid, the most distal part of the colon, while colonoscopy examines the whole large bowel. not the same as, a colonoscopy 2ccf80e805

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
