Beginning with the English missionary Robert Morrison in 1807, thousands of Protestant men, their wives and children, and unmarried female missionaries would live and work in China in an extended encounter between Chinese and Western culture. Most missionaries represented and were supported by Protestant organizations or denominations in their home countries. They entered China at a time of growing power by the British East India Company, but were initially restricted from living and traveling in China except for the limited area of the Thirteen Factories in Canton, now known as Guangzhou, and Macau. In the 1842 treaty ending the First Opium War missionaries were granted the right to live and work in five coastal cities. Following the Chinese Communist Revolution, Mao Zedong replaced the common use of the term "妇女" [nǚren] with "女工" [fūnǚ] as he famously said "妇女顶半边天" (Women hold up half the sky). "女工" [fūnǚ] is a term for labouring women, which signifies the revolutionary role that women play in the liberation of China. The first celebration of "国际妇女节" (International Women's Day) in 1950 consolidated the representational strategies associated with the labouring women concept. 2d854843d0

Female oppression stemmed partly from Confucian beliefs about gender roles in society (such as filial piety), ideas which remain influential. Confucian discourses of filial piety presented the father-son relationship as the model of top-down relationships which reinforced patriarchal dominance in the family and hierarchical structures in lineage groups and communities.
