Common symptoms include abdominal distension, right upper quadrant discomfort, early satiety, heartburn, and shortness of breath. Hepatic (liver) involvement in some diseases can be of crucial importance. This testing is performed on a patient's blood sample. Some tests are associated with functionality (e.g., albumin), some with cellular integrity (e.g., transaminase), and some with conditions linked to the biliary tract (gamma-glutamyl transferase and alkaline phosphatase). Other terms include transaminasemia, and elevated liver enzymes (though they are not the only enzymes in the liver). Elevated transaminases that persist less than six months are termed "acute" in nature, and those values that persist for six months or more are termed "chronic" in nature. Cirrhosis of the liver or fulminant liver failure secondary to hepatitis commonly reach values for both ALT and AST in the >1000 U/L range; however, many people with liver disease have normal transaminases. Muscle sources of the enzymes, such as intense exercise, are unrelated to liver function and can markedly increase AST and ALT. 14-0. Liver transplantation Liver transplantation is highly regulated and only performed at designated transplant medical centers by highly trained transplant physicians. Liver transplantation is a treatment option for end-stage liver disease and acute liver failure, although the availability of donor organs is a major limitation. Rejection may present with lab findings: elevated AST, ALT, GGT; abnormal liver function values such as prothrombin time, ammonia level, bilirubin level Liver transplantation or hepatic transplantation is the replacement of a diseased liver with the healthy liver from another person (allograft). Favorable outcomes require careful screening for eligible recipients, as well as a well-calibrated live or deceased donor match 8e98c081b5

GGT plays a key role in the gamma-glutamyl cycle, a pathway for the synthesis and degradation of glutathione as well as drug and xenobiotic detoxification. 2. form of the enzyme. This transferase is found in many tissues, the most notable one being the liver, and has significance in medicine as a diagnostic marker. High unconjugated bilirubin may be due to excess red blood cell breakdown, large bruises, genetic conditions such as Gilbert's syndrome, not eating for a prolonged period of time, newborn jaundice, or thyroid problems. High conjugated bilirubin may be due to liver diseases such as cirrhosis or hepatitis, infections, medications, or blockage of the bile duct... 8e98c081b5 The name γ -glutamyltransferase is preferred by the Nomenclature Committee of the International Union of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology. These tests include prothrombin time (PT/INR), activated partial thromboplastin time (aPTT), albumin, bilirubin (direct and indirect), and others. The liver transaminases aspartate transaminase (AST or SGOT) and alanine transaminase (ALT or SGPT) are useful biomarkers of liver injury in a patient with some degree of intact liver function 8e98c081b5

Liver metastasis people with liver metastasis Clinical signs include: Higher levels of alkaline phosphatase (ALP) and gamma glutamyl transpeptidase (GGT), and positive A liver metastasis is a malignant tumor in the liver that has spread from another organ that is affected by cancer. This can also be called secondary liver cancer or metastatic liver disease. The liver is a common site for metastatic disease because of its rich, dual blood supply (the liver receives blood via the

hepatic artery and portal vein). People with colorectal cancer are at risk of liver metastases, which dictates their prognosis. Metastatic tumors in the liver are 20 times more common than primary liver tumors (tumors that originate in the liver). In 50% of all cases the primary tumor is of the gastrointestinal tract; other common sites include the breast, ovaries, bronchus, thyroid, and kidney

Polycystic liver disease The much rarer autosomal-dominant polycystic liver disease will progress without any kidney involvement. other signs of inflammation. Imaging, especially Polycystic liver disease (PLD) usually describes the presence of multiple cysts scattered throughout normal liver tissue. PLD is commonly seen in association with autosomal-dominant polycystic kidney disease, with a prevalence of 1 in 400 to 1000, and accounts for 8–10% of all cases of end-stage renal disease. Liver function tests are often normal, though mild elevations in alkaline phosphatase or GGT may be seen

== Nomenclature ==

Jaundice The most commonly associated symptoms of jaundice are itchiness, pale feces, and dark urine. The prevalence of jaundice in adults is rare, while jaundice in babies is common, with an estimated 80% affected during their first week of life. Other primary lab tests for liver function include gamma glutamyl transpeptidase (GGT) and prothrombin time (PT). Jaundice in adults typically indicates the presence of underlying diseases involving abnormal heme metabolism, liver dysfunction, or biliary-tract obstruction. No single test can differentiate between Jaundice, also known as icterus, is a yellowish or, less frequently, greenish pigmentation of the skin and sclera due to high bilirubin levels

Normal levels of bilirubin in blood are below 1.0 mg/dl (17 μ mol/L), while levels over 2–3 mg/dl (34–51 μ mol/L) typically result in jaundice. High blood bilirubin is divided into two types: unconjugated and conjugated bilirubin. Liver biopsy is often required for the diagnosis of a liver problem (jaundice, abnormal blood tests) where blood tests, such as hepatitis A serology, have not been able to identify a cause. It is also required if hepatitis is possibly the result of medication, but the exact nature of the reaction is unclear. Alcoholic liver disease and tuberculosis of the liver may be diagnosed through biopsy. Direct biopsy of tumors of the liver may aid the diagnosis, although this may be avoided if the source is clear (e.g. spread from previously known colorectal cancer). Liver biopsy will likely remain particularly important in the diagnosis of unexplained liver disease. Non-invasive tests for liver fibrosis in alcoholic, nonalcoholic and viral liver diseases are likely to become more widely used. The main features of acute liver failure are rapid-onset jaundice, weakness, and eventually, changes in mental status that can begin as mild confusion but progress to coma, known as hepatic encephalopathy. == Pathophysiology == Polycystic liver disease is often asymptomatic and discovered incidentally during imaging. About 80-90% of individuals do not experience symptoms. When symptoms occur, they are usually related to the size and number of liver cysts causing pressure on nearby organs.
