Indus script The Indus script, also known as the Harappan script and the Indus Valley script, is a corpus of symbols produced by the Indus Valley Civilisation. Most inscriptions containing these symbols are extremely short, making it difficult to judge whether or not they constituted a writing system used to record a Harappan language, any of which are yet to be identified. There is no known bilingual inscription to help decipher the script, which shows no significant changes over time. The urban areas of the Indus Civilisation included public and private baths. Many of the buildings at Mohenjo-Daro had two or more stories. The most widely known Indus Valley sites are Mohenjo-daro and Harappa; Mohenjo-daro is located in Sindh, while Harappa is in Punjab. More than 90% of the inscribed objects and seals that were discovered were found at ancient urban centres along the Indus river in Pakistan, mainly in Harappa and Mohenjo-daro. More than 50 IVC burial sites have been found, including at Rakhigarhi (first site with genetic testing), Mohenjo-Daro, Harappa, Farmana, Kalibangan, Lothal, Dholavira, Mehrgarh, Banawali, Alamgirpur and Chanhudaro . 69d7eb23ec == Businesses and organizations == 69d7eb23ec There are some possible loanwords from the language of the Indus Valley civilisation. Meluhha or Melukhha (Sumerian: 𒀭𒄩𒂗𒂶 Me-luḫ-ḫaKI) is the Sumerian name of a prominent trading partner of Sumer during the Middle Bronze Age. Its identification remains an open question, but most scholars associate it with the Indus Valley Civilisation. Asko Parpola identifies Proto-Dravidians with the Harappan Culture and the Meluhhan people mentioned in Sumerian records. The Indus Valley Civilisation was preceded by local agricultural villages, from where the river plains were populated when water management became available, creating an integrated civilisation.
