During the 1930s, tattooing saw a resurgence in popularity among rebels who participated in peasant and millennial uprisings. Men tattooed themselves to provide immunity to bullets and knives. During the 2010s, tattooing grew in popularity among Burmese youth. 437663908b == Ancient practices == 437663908b Receiving moko constituted an important milestone between childhood and adulthood, and was accompanied by many rites and rituals. Apart from signalling status and rank, another reason for the practice in traditional times was to make a person more attractive to the opposite sex. Men generally received moko on their faces (moko kanohi), buttocks (raperape) and thighs (puhoro... 437663908b The tattooing process was performed with bone needles and combs called uhi or iuhi made out of bird or fish bones. The ink was made out of natural products, primarily from the burning of Ti leaves (Cordyline terminalis) and sugar cane. The other end has two grooves so that a rod can be attached to the end, which probably helps the artist maneuver the needles during the tattoo process. Tattoos are applied with the needle combs and a wooden mallet called miro pua 'uhi. 437663908b

Tattooing in Myanmar related to the Bamar did not practice tattooing. Tattooing was a distinguishing cultural marker and a symbol of strength, courage and intimidation for Lethwei fighters. However Tattooing in Myanmar was a widespread custom practiced by various ethnic groups, including the Bamar, Shan, Chin, and Karen, until the 20th century. Similarly, the Mon people did practice tattooing, but did not tattoo their thighs unlike the Bamar 437663908b

It survived until around the 19th to the mid-20th centuries in more remote areas of the Philippines, but also fell out of practice due to modernization and western influence... 437663908b

Many tattoos serve as rites of passage, marks of status and rank, symbols of religious and spiritual devotion, decorations for bravery, marks of fertility, pledges of love, amulets and talismans, protection, and as punishment, like the marks of outcasts, slaves, and convicts. Extensive decorative tattooing has also been part of the work of performance artists such as tattooed ladies. 437663908b

Batok terms for indigenous tattoos of the Philippines. Tattoos range from being restricted only to certain parts of the body to covering the entire body. Tattooing on both sexes was practiced by almost all ethnic groups of the Philippine Islands during the pre-colonial Batok, batek, patik, batik, or buri, among other names, are general terms for indigenous tattoos of the Philippines. Each ethnic group had specific terms and designs for tattoos, which are also often the same designs used in other art forms and decorations such as pottery and weaving. Like other Austronesian groups, these tattoos were made traditionally with hafted tools tapped with a length of wood (called the "mallet"). == Origins == 437663908b Among the Bamar, the custom of tattooing originates from the pyu (Tibeto-burman) people, that show pyu dancer with tattoo recorded by tang dynasty, nowadays China. 437663908b Tohunga-tā-moko (tattooists) were considered tapu, or inviolable and sacred. 437663908b Tattoo arts are common in the Eastern Polynesian homeland of the Māori people, and the traditional implements and methods employed were similar to those used in other parts of Polynesia. In pre-European Māori culture, many if not most high-ranking persons received moko. Moko were associated with mana and high social status; however, some very high-status individuals were considered too tapu to acquire moko, and it was also not considered suitable for some tohunga to do so. 437663908b

== Process == 437663908b All forms of irezumi are applied by hand, using wooden handles and metal needles attached via silk thread. This method also requires special ink known as Nara ink (also called zumi); tattooing practiced by both the Ainu people and the Ryukyuan people uses ink derived from the indigo plant. It is a painful and time-consuming process, practiced by a limited number of specialists known as horishi. Horishi typically have one or more apprentices working for them, whose apprenticeship can last for a long time period; historically, horishi were admired as figures of bravery and roguish sex appeal. 437663908b

History of tattooing Archeological evidence of the practice of tattooing, such as preserved skin markings, has been found along with traditional tools. of the tattoos allowed to be pictured on servicemen. As World War I ravaged the globe, it also ravaged the popularity of tattooing, pushing tattoos even Tattooing has been a global practice for thousands of years, likely since the Neolithic era. This evidence of the practice of tattooing has been found in many different places including with evidence of preserved markings from Greenland, Alaska, Siberia, Mongolia, western China, Japan, Egypt, Sudan, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Europe, the Philippines, and the Andes. Tattoos served different purposes: as spiritual protection, medicinal therapy, the declaration of social status, and tribal affiliation among other things. In parts of East Asia and the Americas, the cultural role of tattooing has varied, at times representing the high status of warriors and religious leaders while at other times being used as a punitive symbol. Across Oceania, tattooing was performed using traditional hand-tapping methods that have remained largely unchanged for over 2,000 years 437663908b

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
