Adenoviral keratoconjunctivitis A type of adenoviral keratoconjunctivitis in very young children can present with a high fever, sore throat, ear infection, vomiting and diarrhea. contaminated objects. Photophobia develops with blurred vision and lymphadenopathy by the ear nearest the affected eye. It is often associated with a sore throat and stuffy and runny nose, mainly in adults. Viliuisk encephalomyelitis Many infected individuals attribute the initial symptoms as a result Viliuisk encephalomyelitis (VE) is a fatal progressive neurological disorder found only in the Sakha (Iakut/Yakut) population of central Siberia. VE is a very rare disease and little research has been conducted. however, the incubation period would have to be very extensive (in excess of five years). The causative agents, origin of the disease, and involved candidate genes are currently unknown, but much research has been done in pursuit of the answers. They are among the smallest viruses, with diameters of about 30 nanometers. By comparison, other viruses, such as smallpox and vaccinia, are around ten times larger at about 300 nanometers, while influenza viruses are around 80–120 nanometers. 5b51533103

Rhinovirus Rhinovirus is the most common viral infectious agent in humans and is the predominant cause of the common cold, causing at least 50% of cold infections. Only about 5% of cases will have an incubation period of less than 20 hours, and, at The rhinovirus (from the Ancient Greek: ῥίς, romanized: rhis "nose", gen ῥινός, romanized: rhinos "of the nose", and the Latin: *vīrus*) is a positive-sense, single-stranded RNA virus belonging to the genus Enterovirus in the family Picornaviridae. of individuals will experience symptoms within 2 days of infection 5b51533103

People with the COVID-19 infection may have different symptoms, and their symptoms may change over time. No data was available for HFMD or EV-71 in Malaysia before the 1997 outbreak. In the midst of the outbreak in Sarawak, Coxsackie B virus (CV-B) was initially thought to be the causative agent based on the clinical presentation of myocarditis, but not detected among the deceased children. Instead, EV-71 was isolated from these fatal cases. After a few months, Enterovirus-71 was isolated from deceased children in Peninsular Malaysia that died from brainstem encephalomyelitis. 5b51533103 Rhinoviruses are transmitted through aerosols, respiratory droplets, fomites, and direct person-to-person contact. They primarily infect nasal epithelial cells in the airway and cause mild symptoms such as sore throat, cough, and nasal congestion. In a typical infectious disease, the incubation period signifies the period taken by the multiplying Incubation period (also known as the latent period or latency period) is the time elapsed between exposure to a pathogenic organism, a chemical, or radiation, and when symptoms and signs are first apparent. In a typical infectious disease, the incubation period signifies the period taken by the multiplying organism to reach a threshold necessary to produce symptoms in the host

While latent or latency period may be synonymous, a distinction is sometimes made whereby the latent period is defined as the time from infection to infectiousness. Which period is shorter depends on the disease. A person may carry a disease, such as *Streptococcus* in the throat, without exhibiting any symptoms. Depending on the disease, the person may or may not be contagious during the incubation period. Symptoms vary depending on the cause. They often include vomiting, fever, aches, and diarrhea. Bouts of vomiting can be repeated with an extended delay in between. This is because even if infected food was eliminated from the stomach in the first bout, microbes, like bacteria (if applicable), can pass through the stomach into the intestine and begin to multiply. Some types of microbes stay in the intestine. Pathophysiology During latency, an infection is subclinical (also called asymptomatic). With respect to viral infections, in incubation the virus is replicating. This is in contrast to viral latency, a form of dormancy in which the virus does not replicate. An example of latency is HIV infection. HIV may at first have no symptoms and show no signs of AIDS, despite HIV replicating in the lymphatic system and rapidly accumulating... Of those who show symptoms, 81% develop only mild to moderate symptoms (up to mild pneumonia), while 14% develop severe symptoms (dyspnea, hypoxia, or more than 50% lung involvement...

Ross River fever The incubation period is 7–9 Ross River fever is a mosquito-borne disease caused by infection with the Ross River virus. The illness is typically characterised by flu like symptoms combined with polyarthritis and a rash. The illness is Queensland's most prolific mosquito-borne disease. Symptoms of the disease vary widely in severity, but major indicators are arthralgia, arthritis, fever, and rash. The virus is endemic to mainland Australia and Tasmania, the island of New Guinea, Fiji, Samoa, the Cook Islands, New Caledonia and several other islands in the South Pacific

== Symptoms and signs == It is commonly caused by types 8 and 37 adenoviruses. Transmission is by contaminated eye examination instruments and eye solutions, touching eyes of infected people, inadequately chlorinated swimming pools, or other contaminated objects. Foodborne illness While contaminants directly cause some symptoms, many effects of foodborne illness result from the body's immune response to these agents, which can vary significantly between individuals and populations based on prior exposure. requiring an incubation period, symptoms may not manifest for hours to days, depending on the cause and on the quantity of consumption. Longer incubation periods Foodborne illness (also known as foodborne disease and food poisoning) is any illness resulting from the contamination of food by pathogenic bacteria, viruses, or parasites, as well as prions (the agents of mad cow disease), and toxins such as aflatoxins in peanuts, poisonous mushrooms, and various species of beans that have not been boiled for at least 10 minutes

== Background == Although unaffected by the pathogen, carriers can transmit it to others or develop symptoms in later stages of the disease. Asymptomatic carriers play a critical role in the transmission of common infectious diseases such as typhoid, HIV, *C. difficile*, influenzas, cholera, tuberculosis, and COVID-19, although the latter is often associated with "robust T-cell immunity" in more than a quarter of patients studied. While the mechanism of disease-carrying is still unknown, researchers have made progress towards understanding how certain pathogens can remain dormant in a human for a period of time. A better understanding of asymptomatic disease carriers is crucial to the fields of medicine and public health as they work towards mitigating the spread of common infectious diseases.

1997 Sarawak HFMD outbreak and B5 can also cause HFMD. Sarawak is the first state in Malaysia that reported HFMD outbreak. An estimated 28 to 31 of the infected children died as a result. The affected children are aged between five months to six years. Incubation period (period of time from exposure of the virus to the appearance of symptoms) ranges from three to seven days The 1997 Sarawak HFMD outbreak is a hand, foot, and mouth disease (HFMD) outbreak from April until June caused by the Enterovirus 71 (EV-71) affecting 600 children in the state of Sarawak in Malaysia

experience symptoms such as: severe headaches, delirium, lethargy, meningism, bradykinesia, and incoordination. A small percentage of patients die during the acute phase as result of a severe coma.
