He also won the Sporting Group at Westminster in 2004, the first such victory for his breed, and amassed 51 Best in Show awards throughout his career. One of his owners described him as "the most famous Sussex (Spaniel) that has ever lived". Stump was the first of his breed to win that honor and, at 10 years old, the oldest dog ever to win the prize. Stump was initially taken to the Brittmoore Animal Hospital in Houston, but he did not respond to treatment Ch. 2005, so much so that euthanasia was considered

He was handled by Scott Sommer, who also trained 2001 Westminster Best in Show winner J.R., a Bichon Frise with whom Stump lived for most of his life. Stump became seriously ill in 2005 with a body-wide bacterial infection, infection on his heart valves, and other ailments often fatal for dogs. He was so sick that euthanasia was considered. Stump spent 19 days in hospitalization, including 12 in intensive care at Texas A&M University's Small Animal Hospital, and he ultimately survived. c62714febb

The procedure was condemned as cruel and unlawful by the National Anti-Vivisection Society. Outraged by the assault on his reputation, Bayliss, whose research on dogs led to the discovery of hormones, sued for libel and won. c62714febb James Stewart owned a "willful but beloved" Golden Retriever named Beau, of whom he was extremely fond. Beau slept in the corner of Stewart's bedroom, but would often crawl onto the bed between Stewart and his wife Gloria. Stewart recalled, "he was up there because he wanted me to pat his head, so that's what I would do. Somehow, my touching his hair made him happier, and just the feeling of him laying against me helped me sleep better." c62714febb In 2015, the Medical Board of Australia (AHPRA) permanently suspended Nitschke's registration as a doctor due to "professional misconduct and unprofessional conduct". Nitschke has been referred to in the media as "Dr Death". Former UN medical director Michael Irwin branded him "totally irresponsible" for telling people how to obtain drugs that could help them end their own lives, and relatives of people who took their lives after contact with Exit International have denounced Nitschke, saying their loved ones were not in a rational state of mind at the time. c62714febb

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
