The word "rhyme" here is used in the strict sense, called a perfect rhyme, that the words are pronounced the same from the vowel of the main stressed syllable onwards. On the other hand, used words or phrases do not carry typographic markings In analytic philosophy, a fundamental distinction is made between the ordinary use of a term (a word, name, phrase, etc

Cheese is derived from the Old English word *cēse*. The first sentence is a statement about the edible substance called cheese. It demonstrates a use or usage; the writer is using the normal English word cheese, in its typical way, to refer to the common dairy product. The second is a statement about the very word cheese itself as a linguistic entity. This second sentence provides a mention; the writer is mentioning the word but not using it to refer to anything other than itself. Yinglish words (also referred to colloquially as Hebronics) are neologisms created by speakers of Yiddish in English-speaking countries, sometimes to describe things that were uncommon in the old country. Leo Rosten's book *The Joys of Yiddish* uses the words Yinglish and Ameridish to describe new words, or new meanings of existing Yiddish words, created by English-speaking persons with some knowledge of Yiddish. Rosten defines "Yinglish" as "Yiddish words that... British English spelling is consistently used throughout the article, except when explicitly referencing American terms.
