FWM is a phase-sensitive process, in that the efficiency of the process is strongly affected by phase matching conditions. It is similar to the third-order intercept point in electrical systems. Four-wave mixing can be compared to the intermodulation distortion in standard electrical systems

History of manufactured fuel gases London-based Gas Light and Coke Company, incorporated by royal charter in April 1812. Early on, Pepsi struggled with financial stability, going bankrupt in 1923 but was subsequently purchased and revived by Charles Guth, who reformulated the syrup. Pepsi gained popularity with the introduction of a 12-ounce bottle during the Great Depression and marketing strategies like the "Nickel, Nickel" jingle,

doubling sales by emphasizing its value.

His non-alcoholic recipe was directly inspired by the coca wine of pharmacist Angelo Mariani, created in 1863. Local prohibition laws forced him to adapt his recent creation, French Wine Coca.
