An abbreviated version of the WPTAS, the Abbreviated Westmead PTA Scale... Clinically, a coma can be defined as the consistent inability to follow a one-step command. For a patient to maintain consciousness, the components of wakefulness and awareness must be maintained. Wakefulness is a quantitative assessment of the degree of consciousness, whereas awareness is a qualitative assessment of the functions mediated by the cerebral cortex, including cognitive abilities such as attention, sensory perception... == Scoring ==

While other tests of post-traumatic amnesia, such as the Galveston Orientation and Amnesia Test, tend to focus on the patient's memories of the injury, which rely on potentially biased recall and unverifiable information, the WPTAS is composed of objective items that examine orientation and the ability to consistently retain simple information from one day to another.

Glasgow Coma Scale The GCS score takes into consideration three components: eye movements, verbal response (e. While initially primarily The Glasgow Coma Scale (GCS) is a clinical diagnostic tool widely used since the 1970s to assess a patient's level of consciousness. A GCS score can range from the lowest possible score of 3, in which a patient is completely unresponsive and is associated with a state of coma, to the best score possible of 15, in which a patient is fully alert and interactive. An initial score is used to guide immediate medical care after traumatic brain injury (such as a car accident) and a post-treatment score can monitor hospitalised patients and track their recovery.

Coma patients exhibit a complete absence of wakefulness and are unable to consciously feel, speak or move. The person may experience respiratory and circulatory problems due to the body's inability to maintain normal bodily functions. Forty percent A coma (from Ancient Greek κῶμα koma 'deep sleep') is a prolonged state of deep unconsciousness in which a person cannot be awakened, fails to respond normally to stimuli (including pain, light, and sound), lacks a normal sleep-wake cycle and does not initiate voluntary actions. Westmead Post-Traumatic Amnesia Scale The RWPTAS has been shown to be more accurate than the Glasgow Coma Scale in The Westmead Post-traumatic Amnesia Scale (WPTAS) is a brief bedside standardised test that measures length of post-traumatic amnesia (PTA) in people with traumatic brain injury. The WPTAS is the most common post-traumatic amnesia scale used in Australia and New Zealand. It is administered once a day, each and every day, until the patient achieves a perfect score across three consecutive days, after which the individual is deemed to have emerged from post-traumatic amnesia. the Glasgow Coma Scale (GCS) and three picture cards used to measure memory. PTA may be deemed to be over on the first day of a recall of 12 for those who have been in PTA for greater than four weeks. It consists of twelve questions that assess
